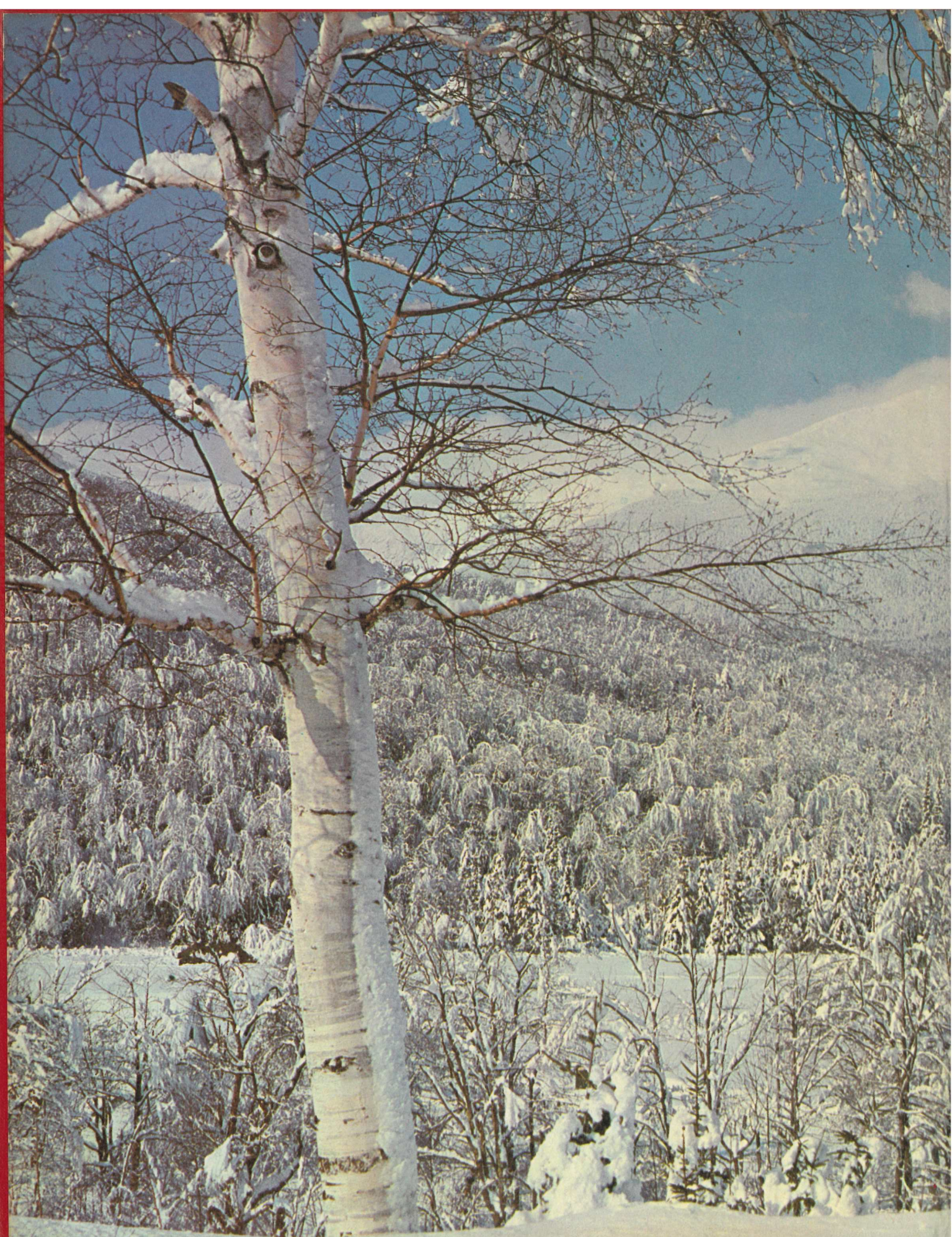

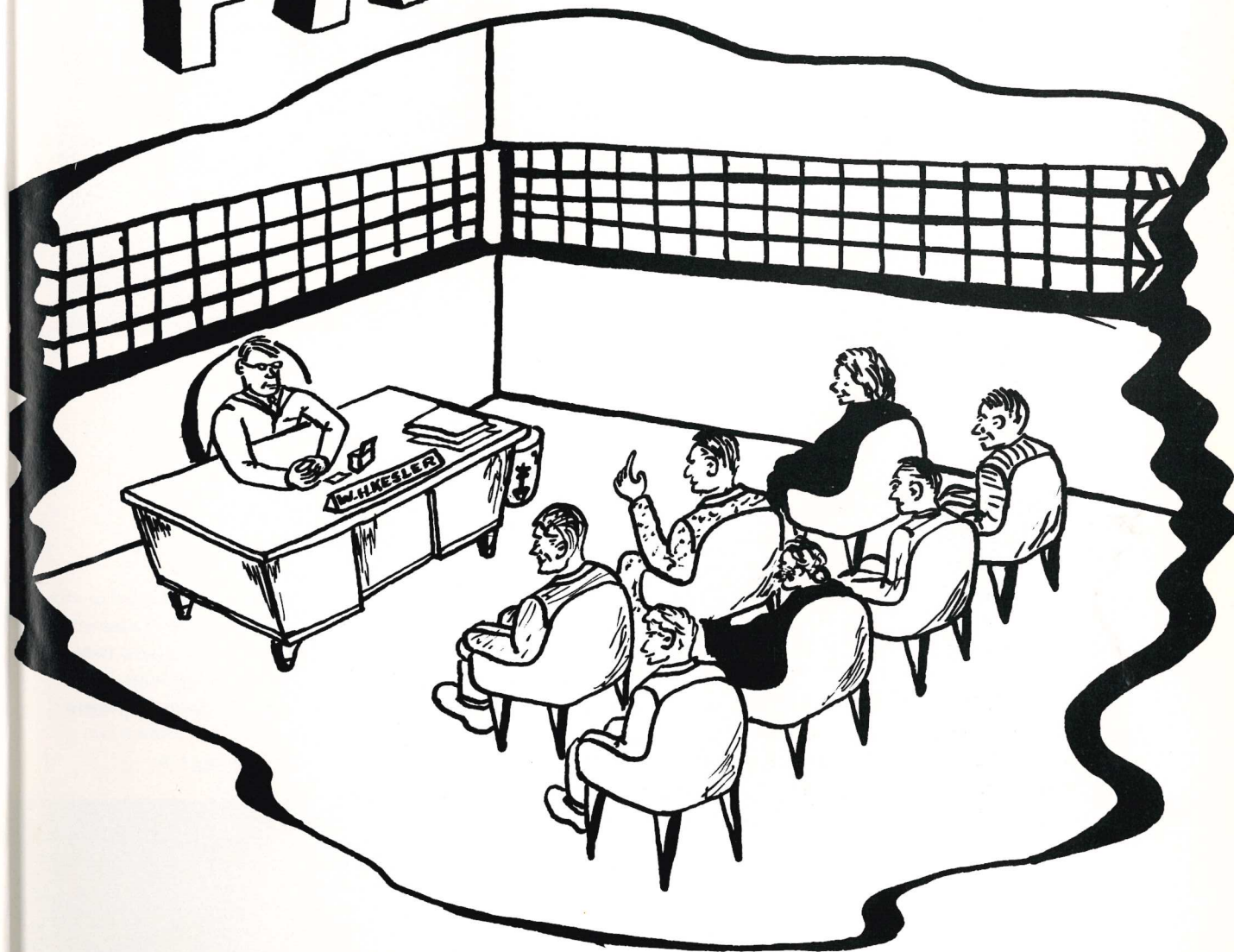

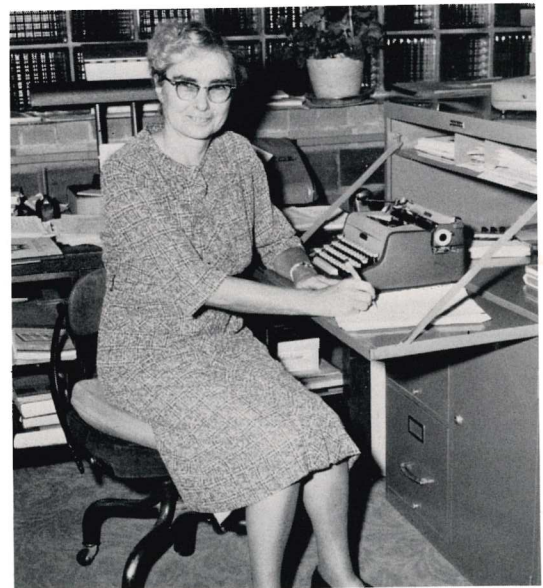
MRS. W. H. KESLER

**MR. LOYD McINTYRE**

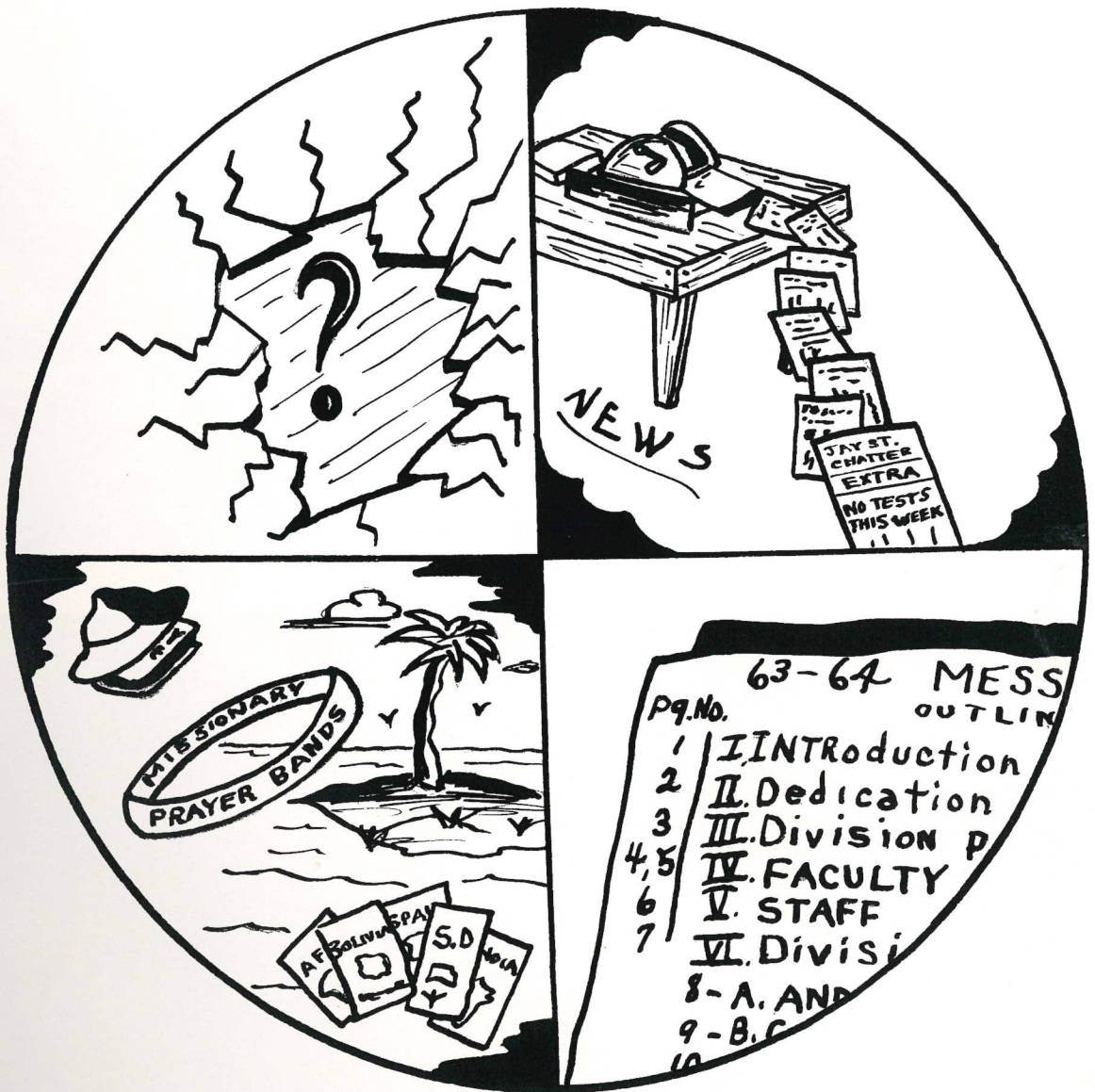

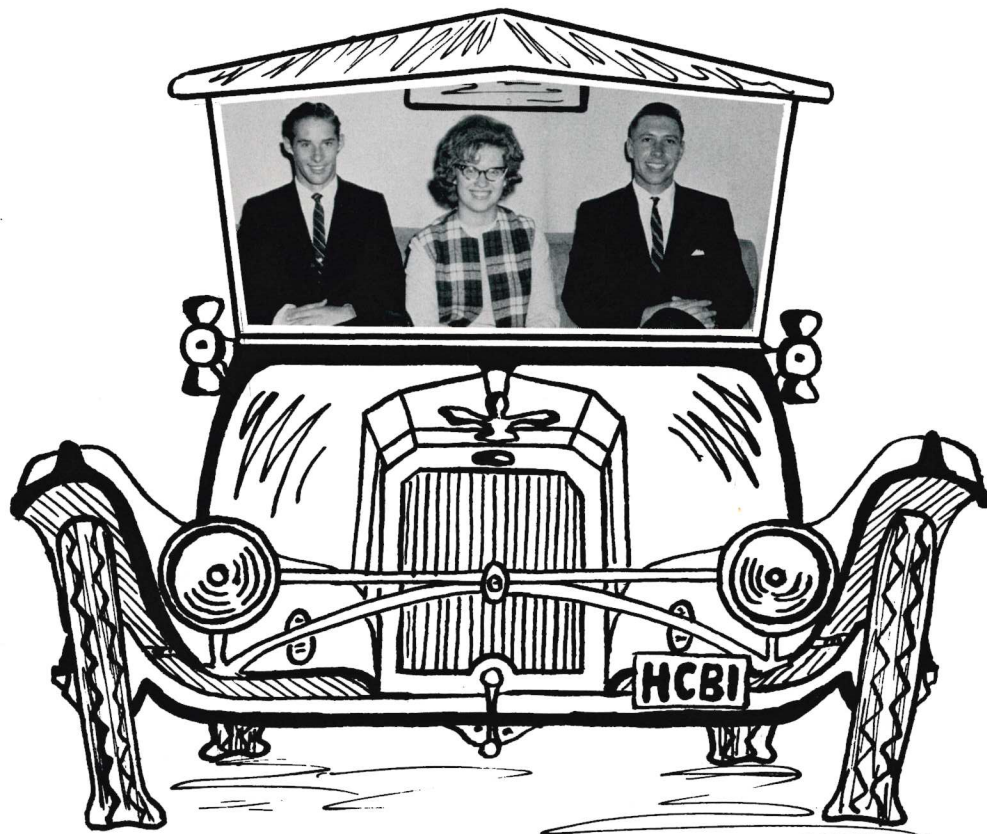
## Daily Chapel

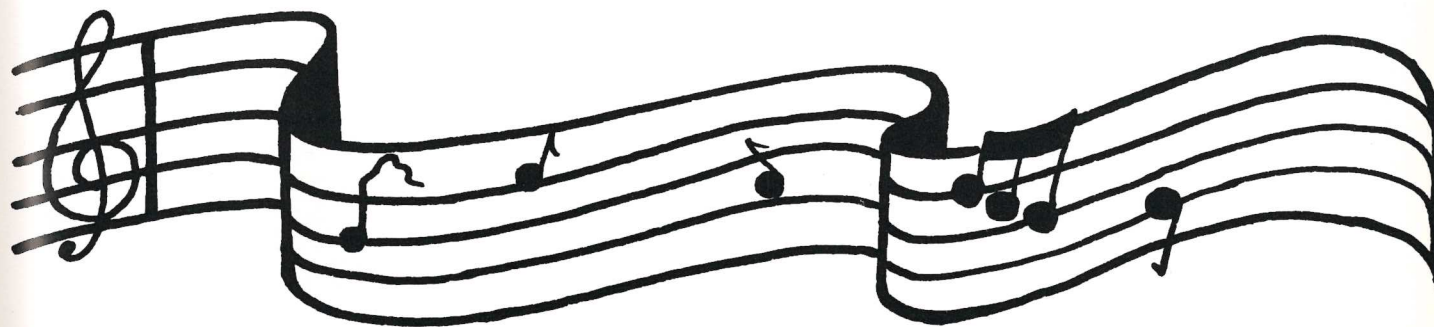
Our orchestra, of which we have a very fine picture, participates in our Sunday evening services as well as practical works, and student services.
