

Lakewood Park Bible School 1948-1959


Rev. L. E. Englar, at that time pastor of our church at Stanley, North Dakota, was the first one to get the vision of a Bible School within our own district. He presented the matter to the North Dakota district presbyters and to the district council in the summer of 1948. After due consideration, sanction was given to open the school in October of that year. Needless to say, very busy days followed. Two large buildings had to be moved in from a district of about forty miles. When school started that fall eighteen fine, young people cast their lot with us to become our first student body. One building had not arrived as yet. The other was definitely in the "rough." How vividly those pioneer days come before our minds. Including this first student body of eighteen, we have had the privilege of seeing one hundred and forty four students enter our doors. Of this number thirty eight have received diplomas.

The school was opened to instruct our young people in the precious truths of God's Holy Word. It has come to be our firm conviction that, whatever one's future holds, a knowledge of God's Word is most vital.

God holds the future. We look forward with keen anticipation to increasing fruitfulness in the years that lie ahead, should Jesus tarry. The urgent need for a thorough knowledge of the Bible increases as the end of the age approaches. It is our desire and ambition to do all within our ability to help meet this need.

During the 1959-60 term at Lakewood Park the enrollment reached 44 and it became apparent that the facilities there were overcrowded. Our attention at this time was drawn to the possibilities of relocating at Aberdeen, South Dakota. In the 1940's the late Rev. P. T. Emmett, pastor at Aberdeen had envisioned a Bible School there. Blue prints were prepared and plans were made to erect a facility which would accommodate the local church and a Bible School. However, before the actual building program was started Rev. Emmett and his brother-in-law were killed when their private plane crashed and burned. The church decided to build the building as Rev. Emmett had designed it even though they were not able to completely finish the educational unit. The potential was there for a Bible School and when it became necessary to move these facilities were made available. The fall term of 19-60 opened in Aberdeen. The school was renamed "Hub City Bible Institute" since Aberdeen is well known as the Hub City of the Dakotas.

Students were housed in homes in the city and the enrollment grew from 47 in 1960 to an enrollment of 107 in the fall of 1965. This taxed the facility to the limit and when the enrollment grew to 143 the following year another move had to be made.

The attention of the Board of Directors focused on the possibilities of purchasing the former Trinity Hospital building in Jamestown, North Dakota. The building was purchased in the winter of 1966 and the following summer an extensive remodeling program was completed. The name was again changed and the school became Trinity Bible Institute. In the fall of 1967 school opened in Jamestown with an enrollment of 197.

Rev. W. H. Kessler served as dean of the school since its inception in 1948 until his retirement in 1969. Rev. Carl Malz filled this vacancy in 1971. With the rapid growth of the school it became imperative that a full time resident president be secured. Rev. Roy H. Wead of South Bend, Indiana was selected to fill this office.

In 1971 with an actual attendance of 227 students the first term and 30 additional applicants for the second term it again became apparent that a move of some nature was necessary. All areas of remaining in Jamestown were investigated but after much prayer and deliberation it was decided that the school would move again - this time to Ellendale, North Dakota.



The fieldhouse and gymnasium contains... basketball floor, bleachers, offices, locker rooms, classrooms... a complete recreation and physical education center.








Rev. Roy H. Wead, president of Trinity Bible Institute, came to Jamestown from nine years of pastoring Calvary Temple in South Bend, Indiana, one of the largest churches in the Assemblies of God.

He is a graduate of Central Bible College in Springfield, Missouri and continued his education at Ball State College, Muncie, Indiana and then later at Winona Lake School of Theology, Winona Lake, Indiana.

President Wead has pastored in Ohio and Indiana where he served as Home Missions Director when this area was called the Central District. A year later, he became the first District Superintendent of the Assemblies of God for the newly formed Indiana District. During his fourteen year administration of the District he saw over 120 new churches opened and developed.

Rev. Wead has been a non-resident Executive Presbyter of the General Council of the Assemblies of God since 1957. While pastoring in South Bend, he was active in the Notre Dame Campus Pentecostal revival and also began a daily television program which he produced and appeared on regularly for seven years.

Rev. Wead and his wife have traveled extensively throughout the world, making two trips around the world and ministering in such places as Bombay, Calcutta, Hong Kong and Manilla. He has visited South America seven times with meetings in Rio de Janeiro, Buenos Aires, and Lima.

His ministry is much in demand and he continues to travel when it can be arranged. His world wide experiences and his emphasis on an annointed ministry are transmitted to the student body as he practices what he teaches - "Rejoice, and again I say, rejoice."



Rev. Carl Malz, the former Vice President of International Correspondence Institute serves as the dean of Trinity Bible Institute and is also a member of the faculty.

Rev. Malz was ordained with the Assemblies of God in 1947. He has attended Central Bible College in Springfield, Missouri where he received his degree, Barrington College in Rhode Island and the American University, Beirut, Lebanon.

In 1952 he left for India and while there became the President of Southern Asia Bible Institute.


In 1958, Rev. Malz returned to the states to accept the pastorate of the First Assembly of God in Findlay, Ohio where he remained for eight years by the unanimous vote of the congregation.

In 1965 he returned to the mission field in the Far East. In Port Said, Egypt, he started a correspondence school in 1966. He later went to Beirut, Lebanon and founded the Middle East Evangelical Theological School in 1967.

He then returned to Springfield, Missouri to become dean and later vice president of the International Correspondence Institute. Here he helped develop a school which has a world wide impact. The ICI has offices in over 60 countries of the world. Courses have been translated into many languages. One course, "The Great Question of Life," has been and is now being translated into over 30 languages. The ICI has an enrollment of over one million.

It was during his visit here to represent ICI that he was approached to consider joining the Faculty and becoming dean of the school.

Rev. Malz is a constant source of inspiration as he challenges the students to excel spiritually, physically and socially.







He has attended Southeastern Bible Institute, Southwestern Junior College, Southwestern Bible College, Evangel College in Springfield, Missouri, and earned his degree from Wichita University, majoring in English with a minor in Business Administration. His personal interest and understanding in student and school financial affairs has helped contribute to the sound fiscal operation of the school.



PAUL DAVIDSON

Rev. Paul Davidson of Hartford City, Indiana joined the faculty on a full time basis in the fall of 1971 after teaching for the previous two years on a part-time schedule.

Rev. Davidson was graduated from Central Bible College, Springfield, Missouri in 1937. He did graduate work at Earhan College, Richmond, Indiana, the University of California in Berkeley and Yale University, Peking, China.

In 1948 Rev. Davidson was appointed as a missionary to China where he served on the faculty of Truth Bible Institute in Peking. When China was closed to missionaries he moved to the Philippine Islands where he pioneered the well known Bethel Bible Institute in Manila which has influenced one of the greatest revival moves throughout the Philippine Islands. He was later asked by the Assemblies of God Missions Department to pioneer another Bible School in Jamaica. This he very successfully accomplished.

Besides his extensive Bible School work, Rev. Davidson pioneered and built churches in Richmond, Indiana and Harrison, Ohio. In more recent years he has been in demand as a Bible teacher in camp meetings, conventions and in our churches.

Rev. Davidson's vast reservoir of Bible knowledge accumulated through years of thorough study is on tap for the students who are eager to draw from these resources. He is always available with ready answers for the student who is eager to learn.


Trinity Bible Institute's work program gives the students opportunity to become involved in the operation of the school.

"The Power of God struck TBI this year as a streak of lightning strikes a tree."


"Students have found that God sends the fire upon the sacrifice ... as many students placed items that stood between them and God upon the altar."
