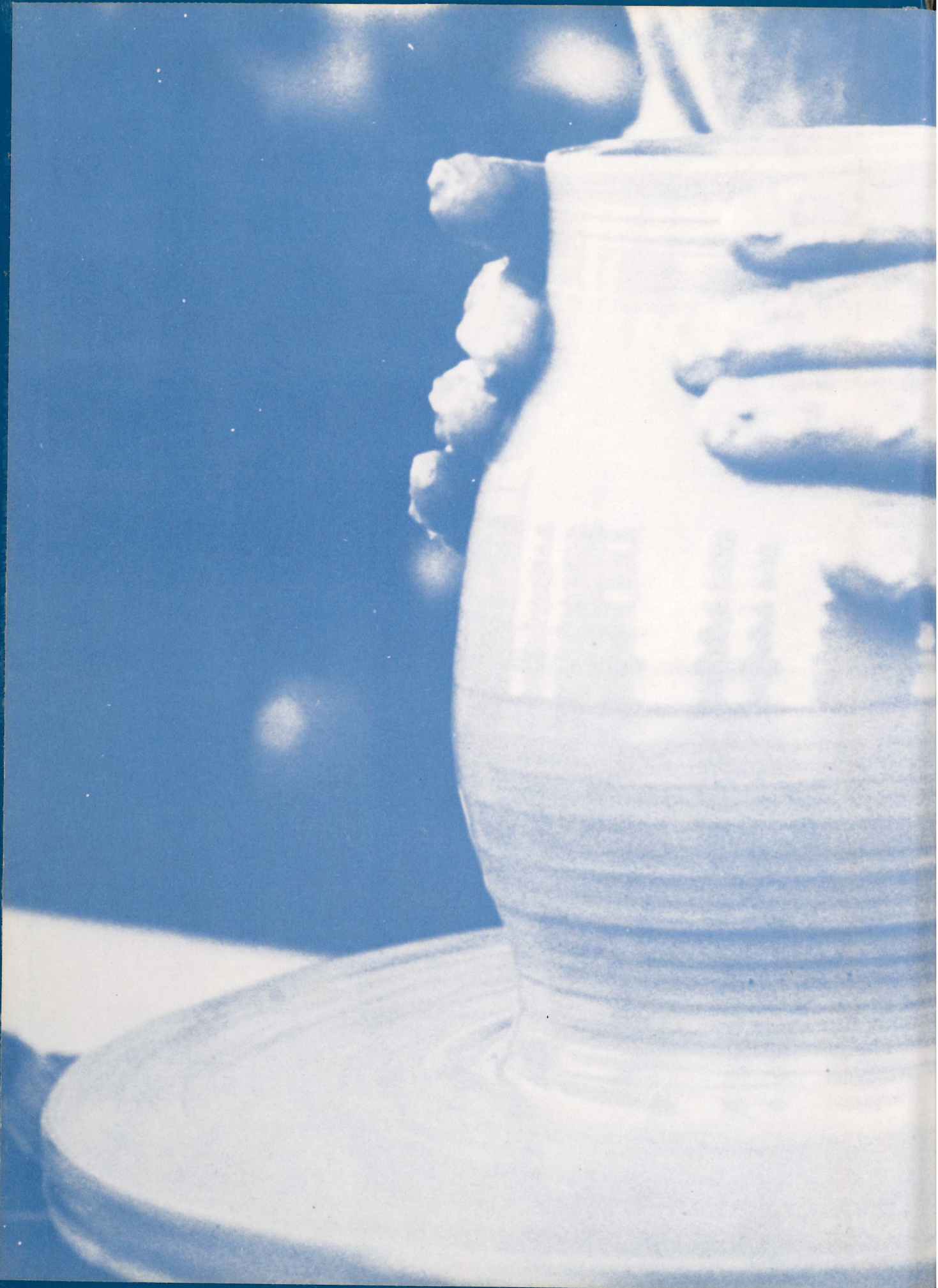
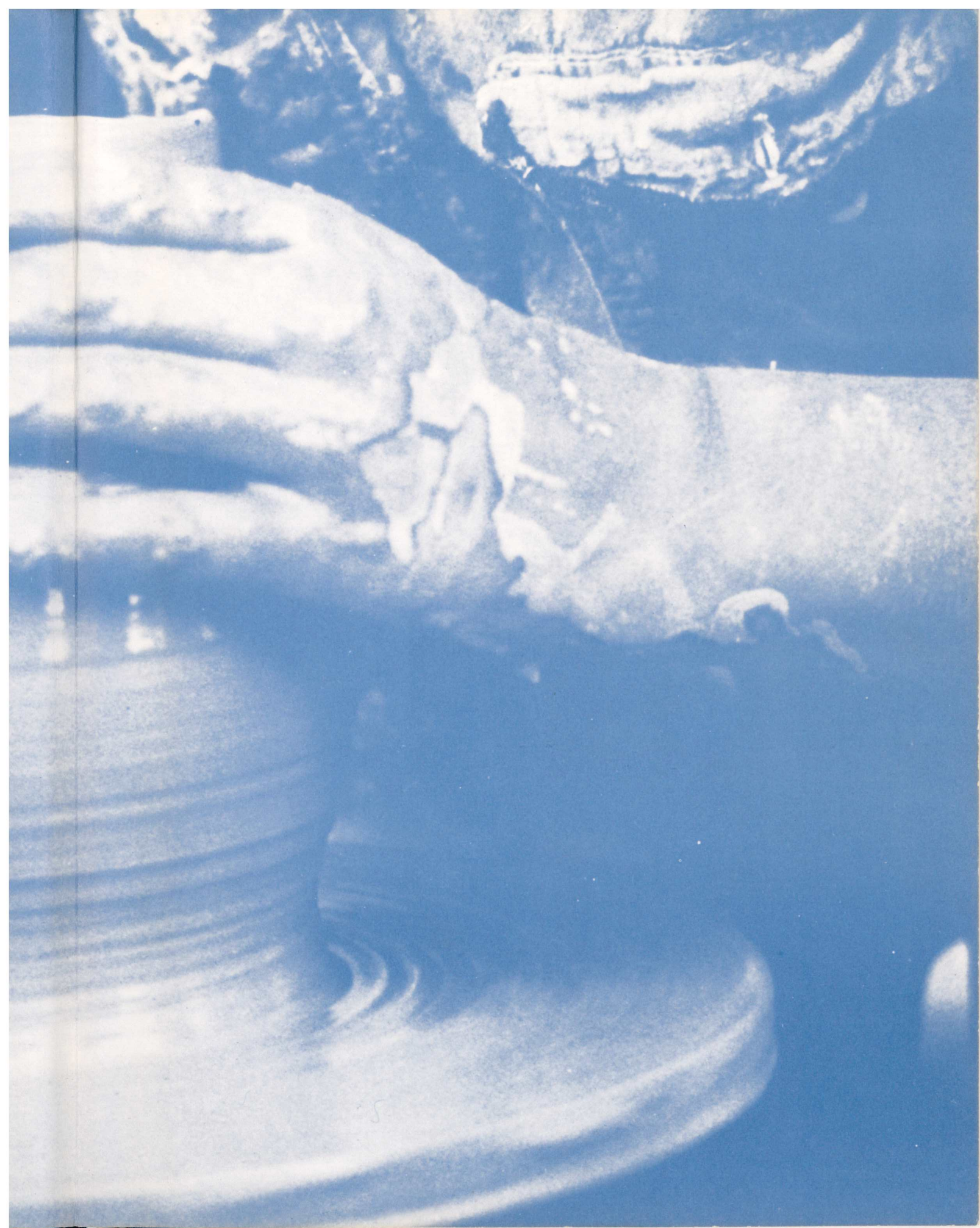

IT'S EASY TO BELIEVE IN MIRACLES — WHEN YOU LIVE ON ONE.

This statement sums up the way we feel about the multi-million dollar miracle campus consisting of 25 buildings spread over 40 acres in Ellendale, North Dakota.

I'm Roy Wead and I would like to share this miracle story with you.

When fire destroyed two of the main buildings on the UND-Ellendale Branch Campus, and the 1971 Legislature denied the necessary funds which took the 71 year old school out of operation, the future looked bleak for the 89 year old community.

Local residents carefully screened the more than 200 applicants to find a school that wanted Ellendale - one that wanted to grow with a town, one that would fit in and compliment the local life style. A special committee worked out the details that became the miracle story of TBI.

The Honorable Arthur A. Link, Governor of North Dakota, speaking at the first annual appreciation banquet held on the campus said, "TBI has found a real home in Ellendale."

Former long time Governor William L. Guy, in office when the preliminary work of obtaining the campus was initiated, expressed the consensus of those present at the banquet when he said, "A miracle has truly happened in Ellendale."

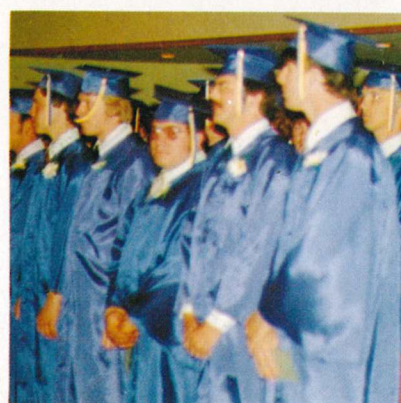
Each year, state officers, educators, businessmen and women who make up the President's council and advisory board - ministers, friends and relatives of the TBI family, fill to capacity the fieldhouse which is completely carpeted and beautifully decorated for the event.

The Rev. T. F. Zimmerman, General Superintendent of the Assemblies of God, was the guest speaker at the 1975 banquet and M. W. Andresen, Dean of Jamestown College, was the Master of Ceremonies.

Other distinguished guests included District Superintendents, S. H. Petersen of South Dakota and Lloyd Jorgenson of North Dakota, and the Honorable Mayor of Ellendale, Vic Steinwand.

The following night, commencement exercises honoring the graduates becomes a fitting climax to yet another eventful year on the miracle campus.

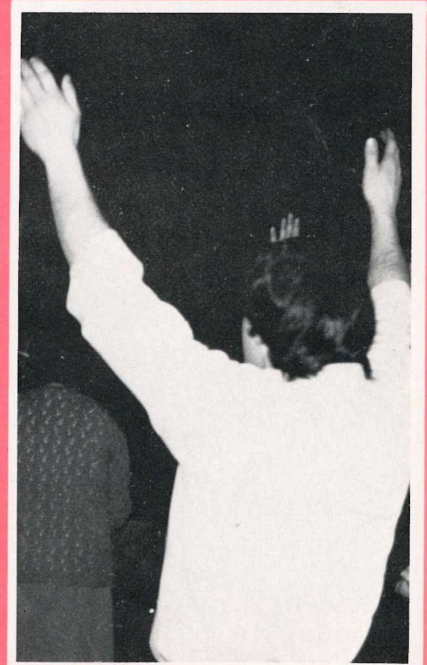
The Ellendale campus has become a SPIRITUAL OASIS far removed from the confusion of metropolitan life. It is here that students come to . . .

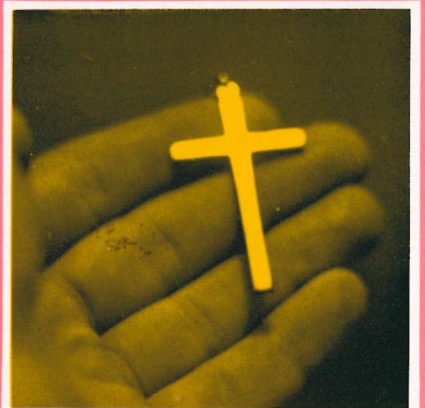
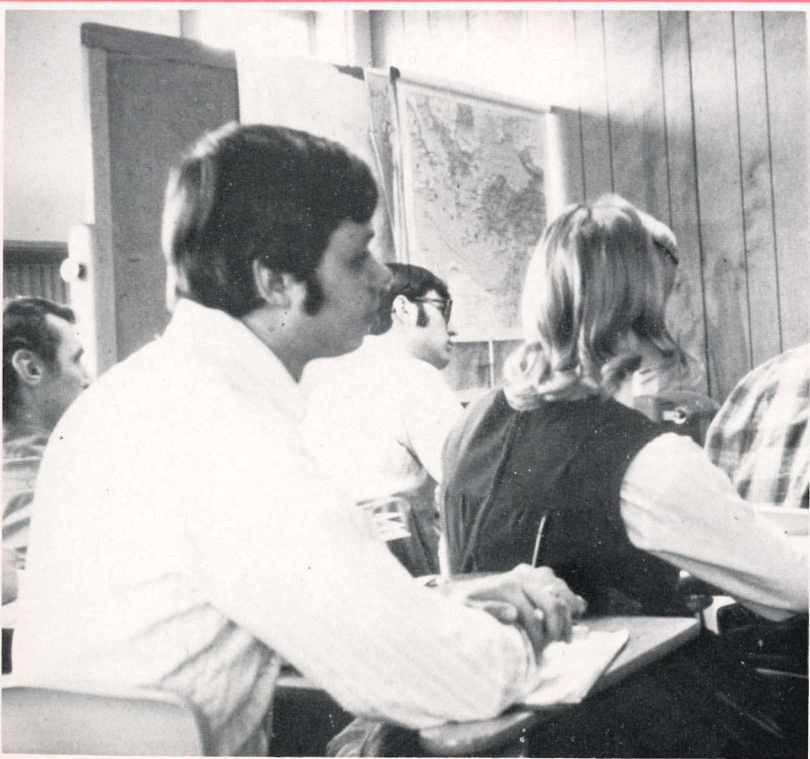
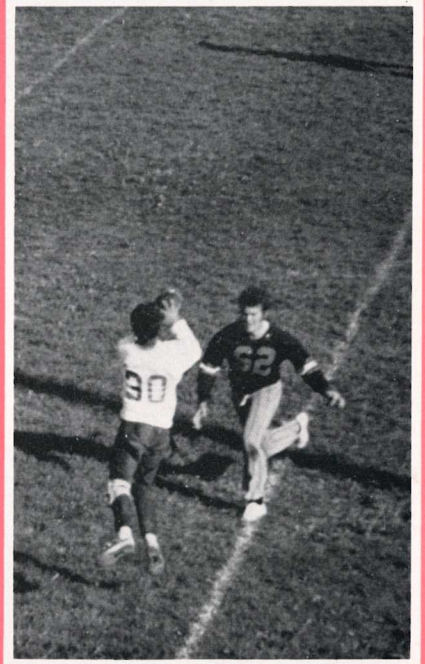

. . . cultivate social graces that they may be well adjusted for future gospel related ministries.

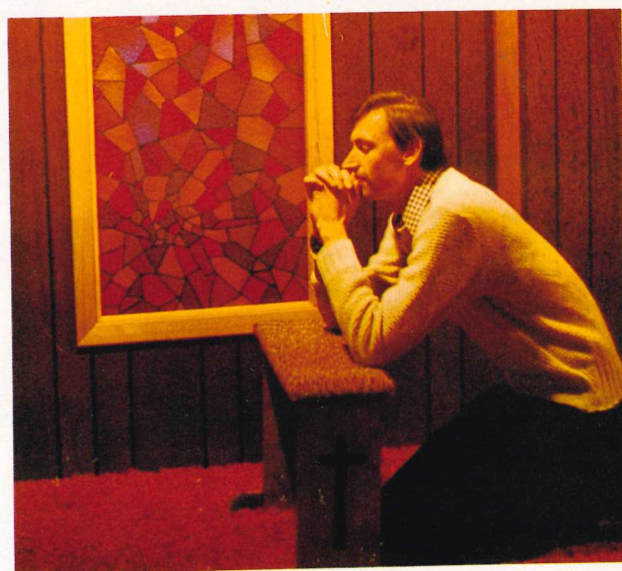

Liechty Hall

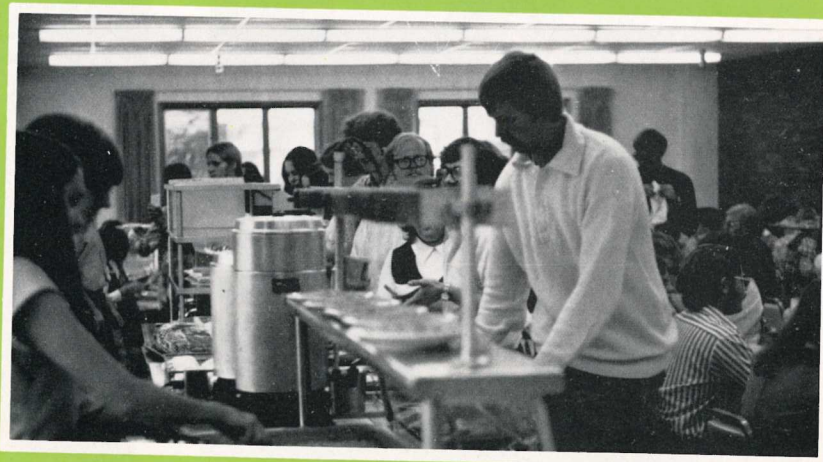




The family atmosphere of Trinity is in keeping with the warm and comfortable life style of this progressive mid-western community.

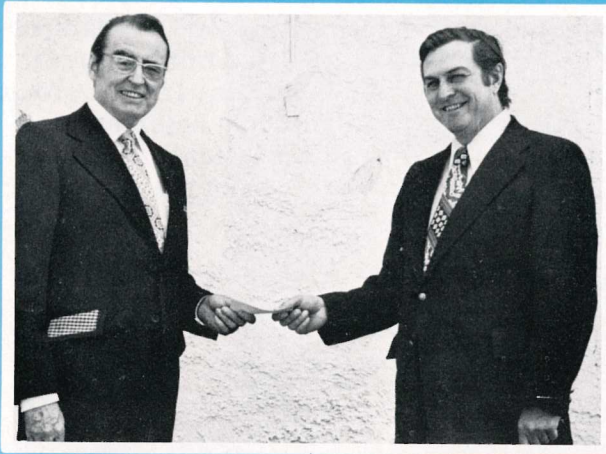
More and more people throughout the United States are finding out there is an Ellendale, North Dakota. More than 450 students from 30 states and 22 denominations - Spirit-filled Protestants and Charismatic Catholics merge together in a delightful cross-section of emotions and abilities. Trinity is dedicated to SATURATE OUR YOUTH WITH GOD'S TRUTH and to provide the atmosphere necessary for development: spiritually, academically, physically and socially.





The Student Ministries Department involves the student population in active off-campus activities. The Crusader Choir and Troubadours enjoy a four state weekend ministry year around and travel for twenty-one days each spring during the interim session. Impact groups involved in door to door evangelism and street ministry, work on the Indian Reservations, Prison Ministry and Child Evangelism outreach are an integral part of practical training. The band enjoys using the instruments valued at more than \$10,000 - part of the miracle package that came to Trinity.





It is now evident that both Ellendale and TBI knew what they were doing when they decided to join forces for their common good.

There has been a stirring change and during a period when other communities of equal size are standing still or losing ground Ellendale is growing.

New homes are being built by local residents and welcome newcomers.

A completely modern unit of 24 apartments, built by the Ellendale Development Association, provides low-cost housing adjacent to the campus, on property once a part of the campus, but deeded now to the city.

TBI students have added to the town's working force and 15 new businesses have opened their doors in the past three years.

Students have no trouble finding employment in the rural area; the backbone of Ellendale economy.

The miracle story of Trinity is more than that of a growing school gaining a new campus. It includes an even more exciting future as the three great forces merge - the Ellendale Business community, farm industry and TBI family - believing that God helping us - TOGETHER WE CAN MAKE IT HAPPEN.

History abounds in tales of adventures who faced death and disaster, and often traveled around the globe in their search for treasure, which later they discovered lay almost at their own doorsteps.

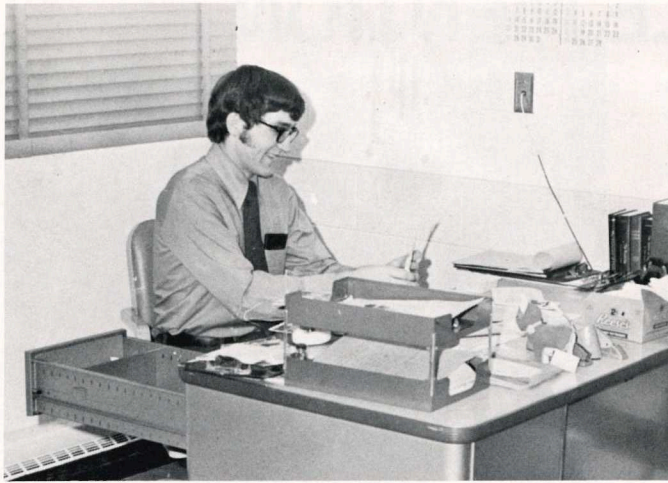
The senior class has searched for one upon whom they could bestow a single honor, and here, right here on our own Campus the discovery was made.

Eloquent Emptiness

Today, I walked through empty classrooms.
Each was cold and hollow and reminded me of a
beach left by the tide.

A few days ago these rooms were wall to wall
with hundreds of vibrant young people, but now
there was a Christmas emptiness. Desks, out of
alignment, and chairs, on the skew, were like
lonely rocks on the seashore.

I thought of the cities, homes and farms to
which these students had returned. For most of
them would be warm, parental welcomes. A
Mother's eyes would quietly watch her son to see
if Bible School had changed him at all. Perhaps
she would detect a new spirit of praise in him or,
maybe, hear his first tentative hopes as to God's
purpose for his life. Perhaps she would see him
in his bedroom bent over the sacred Book. With
a sigh of happiness she will go her way thanking
God.

Pastors would look proudly and expectantly on
their spiritual fledglings and hope they have
brought back enthusiasm and, at least, one story
of triumph and deeper experience in God. Then
the tide will turn and Trinity's halls will fill up
again - to bursting point. They'll be back -
those young people will be back - thirsting for
knowledge of God's Word. The Bible - that's
what they want.

And that's what they get. Every teacher will
pour himself into these students to satisfy their
thirst for the Word. Light on a surprised face,
questions and "thank you's" will indicate this
thirst is being slaked. Teachers will smile and
thank God, for they know that wrapped up in
their student's satisfaction is another, deeper
thirst that will drive them to a continuing study.

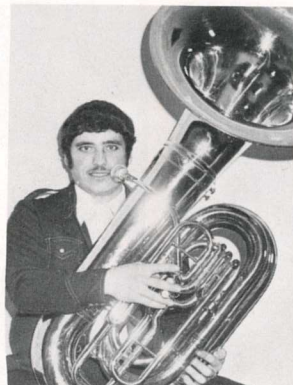
The Crusader Band enjoyed the new uniforms which they were able to purchase this year.

THE TROUBADOUR STORY

The pastor makes the introduction, the director signals the pianist, and suddenly the auditorium comes alive as the Trinity Troubadours break into their theme song, "We've - got - a - great - big - won-der-ful - God . . .". The next 60 minutes pass all too quickly as the students present a fast-moving program of gospel music that bridges all generation gaps and lifts the congregation to worship and praise. Others respond to the spirit of the service as they laugh, cry and relate to the Charismatic Protestants and Catholic Pentecostals who give personal testimonies which tell the beautiful story of God's grace and the power of Jesus Christ to change lives.

One pastor's wife in Iowa said, "When you called to ask if we would have the Troubadours when you came through on tour, I couldn't dare hope that it would be the same group I heard five years ago when I attended First Assembly in Des Moines. What I remembered most was that they came on like a 'semi-truck' and when it was over, you wanted more." After the service was over at the church in Ottumwa she said, "It was even better than I remembered," as young people from their entire section were responding to God; being saved and filled with the Holy Spirit.

Recently, the Troubadours were invited to Grand Forks, North Dakota, for a three day retreat. Activities started with a night of fun for those attending, climaxed by a devotional at 2:00 a.m. where seven youths made a first time commitment to Jesus Christ. Then followed an all-night prayer meeting chain with the Troubadours teamed with the C.A.'s, a day of bus visitation and relaxation, a Saturday evening rally, and a service on Sunday morning. Pastor Charles D. Flewelling and Assistant Pastor Brian Anderson, a TBI graduate, later stated, "Our people fasted and prayed for three days for these meetings and we expected something - but NOTHING as great as this." Dozens were saved and filled with the Holy Spirit, lives were "turned about," and as one Troubadour even expressed it, "I will never be the same after this weekend."

This fall the Troubadours returned again to First Assembly of God in Aberdeen, South Dakota. They were no strangers there. Pastor David Nelson always did a good job with the advertising furnished and prepared the hearts of his people to expect God to minister through these young people. It was a typical Sunday morning except for the record-breaking attendance in Sunday School. At the close of the service the congregation stood with the Troubadours as they sang "Alleluia", raising their hands and praising God. One of the Troubadours approached a man who had indicated that he was interested in receiving the Holy Spirit. All he said was, "You know, it is so easy to receive this gift from God." The man responded, "Yes, I know." He lifted his hands into the air, opened his mouth and began speaking a beautiful heavenly language. Later it was learned that he had been waiting 13 years to be filled with the Spirit. The altars had cleared, people were hugging each other and telling the Troubadours a tearful farewell (even though they were only going 40 miles back up the road to their campus) and the director started to round up the group to go to Banaza where they were to be guests of the local church. Finally, she found the last four - in the prayer room with a middle-aged man, who for 15 years had attended the church but had not received the Holy Spirit. Knowing that Troubadours in this situation would rather pray than eat, she asked the pastor's permission to stay with the fellows and requested he take the others to the steak house. And then suddenly it seemed that there came a rushing, mighty wind from heaven and the Holy Ghost sat upon all of them, and the gentleman was so gloriously filled with the Spirit he had trouble transferring to English as he hugged his family with joy such as only God can give.

Another incident comes to mind. A few years ago when the Troubadour ministry was not too well-known and neighboring pastors kindly invited them for a service out of courtesy, they traveled 100 miles to their destination to find that no advertising had been done but the local people were in faithful attendance. Then it happened: the unique settling of the Holy Spirit as people were saved, others were filled with the Holy Spirit and healed. The pastor got excited. He said, "I have never done this before, but if you have an open date two weeks from today, I want to invite you back. I want to put an ad in the paper, pass out flyers and get this meeting mentioned on the news media. Can you come?" The Troubadours could - and did. This time the large church, including the balcony, was packed for three different services, and who can measure the number of spiritual results when the hearts of the people have been prepared.

Rev. Louie Clifton, pastor of Calvary Assembly of God in Elkhart, Indiana, probably holds the record of having had the Troubadours in his church more times than any other place in the United States. He said, "They get better each time I hear them - the results around the altar are always more than we even anticipated - and don't you dare plan a tour through this area without giving me a call."

The Troubadours have been fasting, praying and practicing and are now ready for their tours. They feel that like marriages which are made in heaven, Troubadour bookings are guided by the Holy Spirit. Pastors who advertise, congregations who invite their unsaved friends and relatives, and the bodies of Christ who take time to fast and pray will not be disappointed. Your efforts at housing, feeding and supporting these groups financially will be repaid because it was God who said, "Give and it shall be given unto you, good measure, pressed down, running over."

We have violated all journalistic rules in trying to portray on these two pages the excitement of a tour covering 15,000 miles in 84 days holding nearly 100 services.

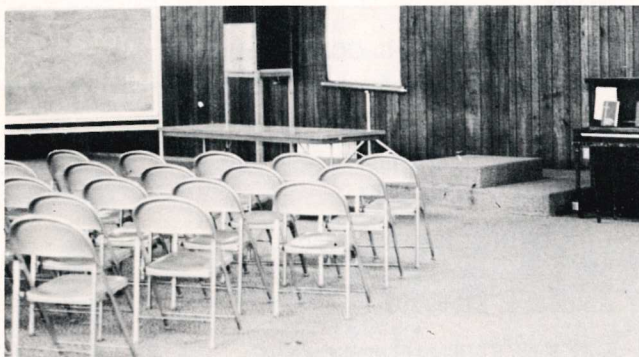
COUNTRNEY'S BOOKS AND THINGS

AD BUILDING GETS NEW LOOK



ARMORY REVAMPED



BOOKSTORE RELOCATED

The old wooden door at the entrance of the Administration building has been replaced with beautiful double doors of steel and glass encased in a brick entry. Plans for future remodeling of this area include carpeting, wall paneling and relocating the campus post office to provide space for a modern reception room.

A warm welcome is extended to all who cross this threshold. This building contains the offices of the President and other administrative personnel, the business department and various classrooms. The first floor classroom has been included in the redecorating and has been carpeted, the ceiling has been lowered and walls paneled.

The upper level of the Armory has a new look. The ceiling was lowered and walls paneled. This multi-purpose building can be divided into two large classrooms or used as one unit for informal gatherings and social events. The married couples use this facility for church services on Sunday morning and unite with the single students in the Block Memorial Chapel at night.

Flowers and trees artistically planted in strategic locations on the 40 acre campus are a part of the overall plan of the landscaping committee for gradual development of the campus beautification programs. Sidewalks have been repaired and rerouted and one student was overheard to say that "if they continue to put walks everywhere the students take shortcuts the campus will be solid concrete."

The printshop was moved to a new location and rearranged and modernized to increase production. It is now located in the area formerly occupied by the carpentry shop. Individual work areas have been partitioned to permit employees to operate at high levels of efficiency. A darkroom has been constructed in this area and the original darkroom maintained for use of students enrolled in photography classes.

The Campus Bookstore now occupies part of the area vacated by the printshop. A complete selection of merchandise is attractively displayed. A full size classroom is adjacent to the bookstore.

The Crusaders are pleased to display the first place trophy brought home for the third straight year from the Freeman Junior College tournament. The home court has been refinished and their emblem embellished in the center circle. Portions of the gym floor and bleachers now sport the blue and gold team colors. The lobby is retiled and the school name imbedded in tile.

The main level of the Library including the reading and reference rooms and all offices have been carpeted in a moss green tweed. This prompted the rearrangement of the checkout desk and study area which led to the birth of the open center concept housing both print and non-print materials. The lower level of the four level building contains the typing room, children's collection, and projection room. Moving the typing area provided carrels equipped with a / c for tape listening stations.

The last brick has been laid on Liechty Hall, the beautiful new motel-style dorm; North and South Wings have been carpeted in brilliant colors and even the honor dorm is sporting a new coat of vivid green paint.
