







## **PLACE**


























#### **PURPOSE**


























Social events often end up as prayer and praise sessions.


The cross-section of students from all walks of life offer the opportunity to merge together in a delightful blending of emotions and abilities.





#### DARRELL ELDER







Rev. and Mrs. Loyal Miller



Rev. Loyal Miller, known as the "Walking Bible," was an instructor at TBI for many years. He is now chaplain for the Message for America team of Sisseton, South Dakota where for the past three years he has been a great asset to the Lundstrom ministry.

Rev. Miller is best remembered for the lengthy portions of scripture he memorizes. Students recall his energetic answers to challenging questions by his response, "Let me give you scripture to prove it." He now uses his vast knowledge to answer questions pertaining to scripture and to counsel those who have special needs.

Rev. Miller was Lowell and Connie Lundstroms, professor in the earlier days when the school was located at Devil's Lake, North Dakota. Lowell asked Rev. Miller for the secret of his scripture memorization and he went to the board and wrote one word - WORK. Lowell said, ''I was afraid of that.''


His very disciplined life style has changed little over the years (just turned 69). He starts each day at 5:30 with prayer and devotions followed by a brisk two mile walk before going to the office. His special memories of TBI include students who had a real hunger for the Word. People who know him often hear him thank the Lord for his own appreciation for the Word of God. His wife Elsie, a cook in the earlier days of TBI, is best remembered for her outstanding Christian character, tender motherly love and her delicious homemade pies and cinnamon rolls.

SUMMER LORK IKORRADORES

The Summer Tour Troubadours, including 18 students, traveled through 19 states holding services for 60 days during the bicentennial year. Their ministry included group rallies, street evangelism, Charismatic fellowships and outdoor services. They participated in camp meetings in Oregon, Colorado and Kansas.





The student, upon completion of this program, can be expected to demonstrate a developing Christian Education ability and to have been provided training essential for ministers of education, ministers of youth, leaders, teachers, and workers in the church school and church related schools.

The prospective missionary will have received an education necessary for helping and strengthening existing national churches. A further aim of the course is to have trained the prospective missionary for civic and educational leadership, at home and in foreign mission service.


