






OUR HERITAGE Lakewood Park Bible School 1948-1959

Rev. L. E. Englar, pastor of the Assemblies of God church at Stanley, North Dakota, was the first to get the vision of a Bible School within the district. He presented the matter to the North Dakota district council in the summer of 1948. After due consideration, sanction was given to open the school in October. Needless to say, very busy days followed. Two large buildings had to be moved a distance of about forty miles. That fall, eighteen young people became the first student body. One building had not yet arrived at the Bible school location. The other was definitely in the "rough." In spite of the hardships and privations of those early months and years, the blessings of God were evident from the beginning.

The school was opened to instruct young people in the precious truths of God's Holy Word. It was the firm conviction of the founders that, whatever one's future holds, a knowledge of the Word of God is vital. This need increases as the end of the age approaches.







The enrollment reached 44 during the 1959-60 term at Lakewood Park and it became apparent that the facilities there were overcrowded. Attention at this time was drawn to the possibility of relocating at Aberdeen, South Dakota. In the 1940's Rev. P. T. Emmett, paster at Aberdeen had envisioned a Bible School there. Blueprints were prepared and plans were made to erect a facility that would accomodate the local church and school. However, before the actual building program was started Rev. Emmett and his brother-in-law were killed when their private plane crashed and burned. The church decided to build the building as Rev. Emmett had designed it even though they were not able to completely finish the educational unit. The potential was there for a Bible School and when it became necessary to move these facilities were made available. The fall term of 1960 opened in Aberdeen. The school was renamed Hub City of the Dakotas.

Students were housed in homes in the city and the enrollment grew from 47 in 1960 to an enrollment of 107 in the fall of 1965. This taxed the facility to the limit and when the enrollment grew to 143 the following year another move had to be made.

The attention of the Board of Directors focused on the possibilities of purchasing the former Trinity Hospital building in Jamestown. North Dakota. The building was purchased in the winter of 1966 and the following summer an extensive remodeling program was completed. The name was again changed and the school became Trinity Bible Institute. In the fall of 1967 school opened in Jamestown with an enrollment of 197.


Rev. W. H. Kessler served as dean of the school since its inception in 1948 until his retirement in 1969. Rev. Carl Malz filled this vacancy in 1971. With the rapid growth of the school it became imperative that a full time resident president be secured. Rev. Roy H. Wead of South Bend, Indiana was selected to fill this office.

In 1971 with an actual attendance of 227 students the first term and 30 additional applicants for the second term it again became apparent that a move of some nature was necessary. All areas of remaining in Jamestown were investigated but after much prayer and deliberation it was decided that the school would move again - this time to Ellendale, North Dakota.



Rev. W. H. Kesler Dean 1948-1969

Rev. William Herman Kesler was born February 6, 1902, to Ella and Jerry Kesler on a homestead near Cando, North Dakota in a household that consisted of two brothers and five sisters. Through the years there were approximately sixty foster children raised in this home.

Since his father was a farmer-minister and having a mother who had a keen interest in the spiritual welfare of her children, Herman, at an early age, received Christ as his Savior

His youth was spent working on his father's farm and attending school. One outstanding highlight of his youth was when he and one of his sisters memorized twenty-five chapters of the Bible. Their reward for this difficult task was a forty mile trip by train to Devil's Lake, North Dakota. He often referred to this occasion. He attended college at Minot Teachers College, Minot, North Dakota. He then went on to Bethany Bible School, Chicago, Illnois.

He married Caroline Miller, June 16, 1925. To this union were born four sons and one daughter. He began his ministry while in Bible School. He took his first pastorate in Minnewaukan, North Dakota, in 1934 and afterward pastored several churches in that District. In 1948, he, along with other ministers of the District, founded Lakewood Park Bible School at Devil's Lake, North Dakotá, and until his passing he was dedicated to the Bible training and spiritual guidance of young men and women preparing for the Lord's service.

This past Spring he was honored by the General Council of the Assemblies of God for fifty years of continuous and faithful service rendered as a member in the fellowship of the Assemblies of God.

He departed this life on Tuesday, September 18, 1979, 2:15 A.M. at his home.

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






WCF Seminar

Many of those who attended the school came to agree that "the most important thing one can do for God or man is pray, for all battles for the lost of the world are won or lost through prayer."



Roy H. Wead, President

In September of 1968, Roy H. Wead became the first President of Trinity Bible Institute. Pres. Wead has served on many college boards and was not a stranger to education. He served on the Board of Directors for eighteen years at Central Bible College in Springfield, Missouri. He was one of the founding directors and currently serves on the board of the Assemblies of God Graduate School, Springfield, Missouri.

The Rev. Wead began his ministry in Ohio and ministered as evangelist, pastor and youth director. He later became the first District Superintendent of the Indiana District Council of the Assemblies of God. In this capacity he was the youngest superintendent in the Assemblies of God. The Indiana District led the nation as the fastest growing District within the most rapidly growing church movement in the United States under his leadership. After fourteen years of serving as District Superintendent of Indiana, he accepted the pastorate of Calvary Temple in South Bend, Indiana. During his ministry at South Bend, he produced a daily television program which appeared regularly for seven years. A new church was built under his leadership and was valued at over one and one-half million dollars. He continued in this pastorate in South Bend until he accepted the presidency of Trinity Bible Institute.

Rev. Wead has been a General Presbyter of the Assemblies of God for 33 years and served on the national Executive Board for the last 21 years, a position he continues to hold.

Rev. Wead has traveled extensively having made a number of trips, literally, around the world and visits to South America for special ministry seven different years.

The Rev. Wead married Rosa Mae Short of Oklahoma City on January 4, 1940. They have four sons, James, Bill, Doug and Tim. Both the Rev. and Mrs. Wead are ordained ministers of the Assemblies of God and have very active schedules. Several of their immediate family are also active in full-time Christian ministry.


Record Number of Graduates

The 1979 Commencement exercises recognized 110 graduates, the largest number in TBI's history.

Fifty-four students received B.A.'s this second year of the four-year degree program, compared to 34 students in 1978. Forty-one received the three-year A.A., and 15 students received the two year diploma. Fifty-five per cent of those receiving degrees had a Ministerial Concentration with the Bible major.
