

## **A DREAM IS BORN**

A dream was born in the heart of a man - an impossible dream it would seem. But, it never faded. It only grew stronger. He shared the dream - or vision with other stout-hearted men from North Dakota, who were used to combating adverse conditions. Winters were stormy and frozen while summers were hot and dry.

The man's name has been forgotten by most people, and that is probably the way he would want it. This God-chosen man, Rev. L. E. Engler was entrusted with a plan which would expand far beyond his initial concept.

Let's see how it happened. L. E. Engler was born near Minot, North Dakota and spent his early years on a farm. His mother was a widow so he remained at home and helped make the family living by teaching in elementary school. But, in 1933, he received Jesus Christ as his personal Saviour and was soon called into the ministry. Engler served outstation churches near Minot before he accepted the pastorate at Stanley, North Dakota.

Here, God began to speak to his heart about starting a short-term Bible school in the Dakotas. There would be classes from October through March to meet the need of the rural population. Students could help with farm crops and attend school in the winter months.

His vision burned brightly, but it was not enthusiastically supported by others. Then Rev. W. H. Kesler and Rev. G. L. Riffe became interested in the project. They gave Engler much valued support and help in the basic planning. In 1948, the "seed was planted" in the hearts of the District Presbyters of the North Dakota District Council of the Assemblies of God.

That fall buildings were made ready on the North Dakota District camp grounds in Devils Lake. The name was selected, *LAKEWOOD PARK BIBLE SCHOOL*, and that first year 18 students found their way to the new campus. The school's opening had to be postponed for one week as the women's dormitory was not ready . . . and the men's dorm had not yet arrived! It had to be moved in from Leeds where it was serving as a chapel. And, oh, yes, two cisterns had to be built because an adequate supply of water presented a major problem.

God put his approval on the birth of this training center for ministry. That first year, 5 of the 18 students received the Baptism of the Holy Spirit. The first graduates in 1951 were Paul Adrian, Ruth Dawson, Ernest Enget, Lorraine Huwe and Edith Lindell.

Firm foundations were laid those first years. The Bible would be the textbook with supplementary materials carefully chosen. The practics needed for effective ministry would be a vital part of training, taught by Spirit-filled instructors.

Missionary Prayer Bands would meet each week to pray for the missionaries and to learn more about the "harvest field." Music was recognized as an important means of reaching the world, and the entire student body made up the radio choir which broadcasted each Sunday morning.

The physical education department consisted of games like table tennis, darts, and there was ice-skating and horseshoes. Because boymeets-girl has always been a vital part of Bible school experience, a social night was held every other week with parties and sleighrides for fellowship and fun.

Well, that is the way it started. In the first 10 years there were 144 students with 38 graduates. Maybe you recognize some of the LPBS people:

The enrollment reached 44 during the 1950-60 term and the Lakewood Park facilities were overcrowded.

A move to Aberdeen, South Dakota was considered. In the 1940's, the late Rev. P. T. Emmett envisioned a Bible School at that location. Blue prints were prepared, and plans were made to erect a facility which could accomodate the local church and a Bible School. But before the actual building program started, Rev. Emmett and his brother-in-law were killed when their private plane crashed and burned. The church body decided to build the building as Pastor Emmett had designed it even though they were not financially able to completely finish the educational unit.

The potential was there for a Bible School. The fall term of 1960 opened there, and the school was re-named *HUB CITY BIBLE INSTITUTE*, since Aberdeen is well known as the Hub-city of the Dakotas.

Students were housed in homes in the city. The enrollment grew from 47 to 107. In Aberdeen . . .

... students continued to study the word of God ... students continued to pray for the missionaries in weekly Missionary Prayer Bands

... students continued to use their musical talent in choirs, quartets and trios. The Messenger trio made a record and traveled 10,000 miles holding 120 services

Rev. W. H. Kesler was now dean of the school, an office he held from 1948 until his retirement in 1969. The school was growing rapidly, and no one knew why! No extensive advertising had been done. Students told potential students, and pastors told people about it. They like this small school which was dedicated to teach young people how to love the Lord and how to transfer that love into effective service.

Then, in 1966, when the enrollment mushroomed to 143, the search was on for a new home. The Board of Directors decided to buy the former Trinity Hospital in Jamestown, North Dakota. During the summer of 1966, extensive remodeling was completed. The name of the school was again changed to match the name engraved on the exterior of the building, and LPBS or HCBI became TBI - TRINITY BIBLE INSTITUTE. That fall school opened with an enrollment of 197.

## JAMESTOWN - TBI 1967 - 1972

It became imperative that a full-time president be found to keep the flame alive and burning brightly. Meanwhile in South Bend, Indiana, a former District Superintendent and pastor of a large growing church was feeling the tug on his heart to "move on" to something new.

When the call came to Roy H. Wead to return to his boyhood state to become President of Trinity Bible Institute, he did not hesitate. He came. Students continued to come.

They were still using the Bible for their textbook, taught by Spirit filled instructors.

They were still learning about mission fields in missionary prayer bands each week.

They were still developing their musical talent and abilities as choirs, small groups and the Troubadours traveled during the school year and interim break.

Then in 1971, with an actual attendance of 227 students and an additional 30 applicants for the second term, it became apparent that another move was necessary.

But Jamestown did not want to let them go! They liked the growing student body which provided a dependable work force for the local businesses. They liked the friendly spirit of the team that was working hard to provide a place for young people to prepare their lives for ministry and service. But after all areas of remaining in Jamestown were investigated, and after much prayer and deliberation, it was decided that the school would move again.

So, Trinity Bible Institute was a college in search of a campus and Ellendale, North Dakota. 65 miles south, was a town in search of a college. They had a campus and empty buildings which were formerly occupied by the University of North Dakota - Ellendale Branch. Due to a gradual decline in student enrollment and a fire that destroyed the school's two primary buildings, the decision was made to close the campus after 71 years of service. Things looked bleak for the 89 year old community. A \$25,000 advertising campaign was aimed at 1,000 prospective buyers. Two hundred applicants were screened, but TBI was selected to receive the 3.5 million dollar campus for a token payment of \$1.

A three story modern dormitory for the men . . . A bright, cheery dining hall which also houses two wings of dormitory space . . . A modern fieldhouse with full size basketball

court and 1700 bleacher seats . . .
A spacious library which now houses 70,000 cataloged volumes, and an OCLC computer system which provides 5 million summaries of books and materials

A modern, efficient heating system providing adequate warmth during the blustery winters.

Duplexes badly in need of renovation, but with

the potential of housing for married students and a large area suitable for a mobile home park

The TBI family moved in and their first project was the renovation of the duplexes to get ready for the fall semester of 1972

The Walter and Hattie Block Memorial Chapel was the first new building constructed following year. It stands in the very center of the campus as a constant reminder that God is the center and head of all Trinity activity

Liechty Hall was built, fully carpeted with private bath in every room; a motel style dormitory for upperclassmen, special guests and visitors.

Yes, things were changing at TBI. It was no longer a short term 6 month school. Under the capable leadership of President Roy Wead, TBI became a four year Bible College, fully accredited with the American Association of Bible Colleges and endorsed by the Assemblies of God educational department.

Also, graduates now qualify for state certification as public and church related school Other changes took place. At former locations, the athletic program was not developed because of lack of facilities. In 1978, the Crusader basketball team received national recognition as Midwest Regional and District Champions of the National Christian College Athletic Association. For the past two years, TBI has won either the Northern Inter ollegiate Christian Conference Tournament or Conference Title. The Lady Crusaders took first place in conference play and placed second in NICC tournament in 1982. In 1982 the first Cross Country Team took top place in the NICC tournament. And the tennis team adds a new dimension to sports at TBI, with individual players winning conference recognition. The new facilities and equipment made other changes possible. The 12 pigeon-hole style mailbox at Jamestown was replaced by a 500 post office box unit in the Administration Building. The two portable electric typewriters used by the entire office staff in former locations was replaced by 50 IBM electric typewriters, making it possible to add a business department to the curriculum. Radio broadcasting sparked into life in Jamestown when a student brought his 1/2 watt science experiment to school. This has slowly grown into a 20 watt AM carrier current outlet with plans of being 10 watt FM in the near future. The yearbook, campus advertising, catalogs, and promotional materials are all printed in the Campus Print 'n Press, inspired by the printing equipment which came as a part of the transfer of property. TBI also has darkroom facilities to develop and print pictures used in campus publications. The music department was blessed with band instruments valued at \$10,000 and pianos and organs. The House of Music was later established with private practice rooms and a studio for musical talent.

### **ELLENDALE - TBI**

Yes, some things have changed. But they were all physical changes necessary to meet the needs of students, from 30 states and more than 20 denominations, who find their way to the campus in North Dakota where they receive an old fashioned charismatic education in a progressive atmosphere. The peaceful prairie surroundings contribute to an ideal, relaxed atmosphere for study and prayer. They receive the finest academic preparation for their choice of area:

Ministerial, missions, music, business, secretarial, communications, Christian education or elementary school teacher training.

The Bible is still the textbook at TBI. A highly trained staff of born-again, spirit-filled instructors teach the students how to integrate their faith and academic discipline.

Missionary Prayer Bands still meet each week, and the annual missionary convention brings the needs of the world to the TBI doorstep.

Musical and Ministry teams still travel on weekends and during the spring break.

Classes are still interupted as the Holy Spirit takes over and students worship and praise the Lord.

Students still come to study to show themselves approved unto God, rightly dividing the Word of Truth, to develop their minds that they may give to all men a reason for the hope that is in them.

In 1982, President Ron Hastie picked up the mantle and now leads the institution on to new goals and accomplishments as he follows the dream God placed in his heart.


The early days of TBI have become obscure, but the dream and vision God planted in the heart of a man who obeyed him continues to grow brighter and clearer.










### **DEDICATION James Hernando**

# HASTIE ACCEPTS PRESIDENCY

The Rev. Ronald Hastie of Peoria, IL, accepted the presidency of Trinity Bible Institute, Ellendale, ND. Assuming the position on June 30, Hastie succeeded the Rev. Roy H. Wead who retired. In the announcement to the student body, Wead highly endorsed the Board's selection. He noted Hastie's practical experience as significant to the the office.

Hastie was senior pastor of the First Assembly of God, Peoria, IL for the last five years. The church had a membership of 740 with Sunday attendance exceeding 1,000. He worked with a multiple church staff of ten and the Assembly's Christian school and day care center staff of 25, servicing 200 children and youth.

Besides serving as vice president of the Board of Directors of Evangel College, Springfield, MO, Hastie is a member of the Board of Directors of the Assemblies of God Graduate School, Springfield, MO.

After attending Central Bible College, Springfield, MO, Hastie entered the ministry in 1952. Since that time he has pastored six churches, served as an associate pastor, and ministered as an evangelist.

The Rev. Hastie and his wife Janice reside in Ellendale. They have three grown children.

... all of these are essential blocks in the foundation that is being laid at Trinity.




The Gospel Sounds

An accident in Poplar Bluffs, MO, Sunday, August 15, took the lives of two young women from Laurel, Montana. Melodie Unterseher, 27, was killed in the accident and her sister, Valerie, 32, died 3 weeks later from injuries received. They were enroute to Springfield, MO in their travel bus, when it collided with a tractor trailer on a rain slicked highway. Also killed in the accident was another member of the group, the Rev. Grace Marr, whose 14 year-old-daughter also suffered serious injuries. Listed as a third fatality in the accident was the driver of the tractor trailer.

Both girls attended Trinity Bible Institute and were licensed ministers of music. They devoted their lives to singing and spreading the love of Jesus. Melodie was pianist for the Troubadours for 3 years while at TBI. Survivors include their parents, Emil and Florence Unterseher of Laurel; two sisters, Emilie Williams of Laurel and Vickie Riojas of Lambert; and three brothers - Richard of Casper, Wyo., Rev. Robert of Hettinger, ND and Raymond of Watford City, ND.





