I ask you to always remember Trinity. Pray for us each day and support us. We want to continue with the finest teachers and the newest resources, and we need


your help.

PRESIDENT LOWELL LUNDSTROM


The Rev. Lowell Lundstrom became president of Trinity Bible College in the fall of 1983. Under his leadership, the enrollment has nearly doubled—from 289 students in 1983 to nearly 500 today.

President Lundstrom and his wife Connie are 1960 graduates of Trinity. Back then, the college was called The Lakewood Park Bible School and was located in Devils Lake, N.D.

Along with his work here, the president is a full-time evangelist. Every year in his nationwide crusades, an estimated 10,000 people come forward to dedicate their lives to Jesus Christ. The president also serves as executive director of Central Indian Bible College in Mobridge, South Dakota. He is an author, singer, songwriter and host of his own weekly television show-which reaches thousands with the Gospel. He and his wife Connie have four children: Londa, Lisa, L.J. and Lance.












One of Trinity's most warmhearted couples — Steve and Dawn Wagler — are truly appreciated by this year's senior class.

IN MEMORIAM—WARREN DAHLSTROM

Dahlstrom, 44, died in June 1986 of an apparent heart attack, according to newspaper sources.

After completing one year of studies at Trinity, he began


a new job at a Christian radio station in Columbus, Ohio. It was there that he died suddenly.

He left the station in 1983

and later worked for a radio station in Las Vegas and a TV station in Houston.

Dahlstrom was born in St. Paul. He attended North-western College there, then the Brown Institute in Minneapolis for his broadcast training.







CHILDREN'S CHURCH


The children of Trinity students are well taken care of by other Trinity students interested in learning about this "youthful" church ministry.







Linae Rice and Steve Howard recall the beautiful Indian children who were shy at first, but who slowly reached out toward their Trinity guests and received them with warmth.

Dennis and Mary Jordan said, "The reactions of the Indian congregation as we sang about love and salvation were wonderful. Even the pastor's faith was strengthened by the power of the Holy Spirit."

Abe Chopper also recalls visiting the jail and hospital: "I remember one man who listened so intently to the message of deliverance through Jesus and another cupped his ears to hear better when we began to sing. It was a great day for everyone!"

CSSA: JERICHO 86 & 87...

This fall, more than 200 Trinity students, faculty and administrators drove to Grand Forks, North Dakota, to participate in Jericho '86—a silent march to ban abortion in the state of North Dakota.

The demonstration was led by evangelist Penny Lea, whose goal is to stop abortion not only in this state, but throughout the nation.

"The significant thing that hit me there," says senior Bruce Kaufman, "was the reverence the marchers had for God and the intensity they had against abortion." Kaufman is the president of Trinity's Christian Students for Social Action (CSSA) chapter, which organized the trip.

Altogether, about 5,000 people gathered in the town

for the rally. "There were Catholic priests and nuns and Methodist, Baptist and



Assembly of God members present," Kaufman says. "We were all together, singing hymns and praising God. No one was holding up the denominational flags, but we were coming out as one to help end this great atrocity."

"I was delighted to see that so many Trinity students made the commitment and took the time—some at their own expense—to be involved," says instructor Amy Strang, who also participated in the march.

"I certainly think we should speak out—the silent majority has continued too long."


NURSING HOME MINISTRY







Students also can earn credits in Chapel Choir and/or Instruments of Praise.













WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL TEAM

For the first time in the history of Trinity Bible College, the Women's Volleyball Team won the national championship tournament of the National Bible College Athletic Association.

Eight colleges competed in the tournament, which was held Friday and Saturday, Oct. 17 and 18, 1986, in Rochester, Minnesota.

During the competition, Trinity won a total of 16 games and lost only two.

"It was a dream come true," says volleyball coach Jeff Nelson. "The girls played good, strong volleyball. There were a lot of tears and rejoicing after the

final victory."

Trinity freshman Michelle Rondeau was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player and an All Tournament Team Member. Senior Kathy Anderson and sophomore Kathy Lyon received All American Team Awards.

"We owe all of our success," Nelson says, "to Trinity's 'Total Release' philosophy. The girls give all they have—on and off the court—to become more like Jesus. He's who we play for. He's all that matters."

The team's final record for the year was 19 wins, 11 losses and 1 tie.




WRESTLING TEAM


"We even witness while we're

wrestling," John adds. "If an opponent pins me down, I'll often compliment him, saying 'good move,' and that's bound to have an influence.













April 24, 1987 was an exciting night for Trinity graduates as they received their diplomas.


The guest speaker was Dr. Roy Wead, former president of Trinity Bible College.
