














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# Trinity Reaches 40th Birthday!

"I testify it was like an old-fashioned Pentecostal camp meeting everyday. The students began a Sunday School in the park and lead several souls to Christ."

These words, by Trinity's first dean — W.H. Kessler — tell the story of Trinity's first class in 1948. The college was then named Lakewood Park Bible School and located in Devils Lake, North Dakota.

Kessler continued, "We wish to praise God for the spirit of revival that prevailed in the school during the entire term!"

That was 40 years ago — and yet the spirit of revival that marked the birth of Trinity then still is alive and well at the college today!

In fact, Trinity hasn't changed much at all in relation to the basic principles on which it was founded: "To prepare young people for full-time ministry or missionary work, to give them the desire to seek and know God and to teach them how to harvest souls for the kingdom."

We remember Rev. L.E. Englar, a pastor in Stanley, North Dakota, who had the first vision of Trinity. He presented the idea to the North Dakota District Presbyters in the summer of







## 18 Students In First Class

1948 — and the college was born! When the doors opened that fall, 18 students enrolled.

There were students like Ruth Dawson, and the history books say her motto was, "A giggle a day keeps the doctor away." And students like Dean Paulson, of whom his classmates wrote, "He has a tie assortment that will make your eyes blink."

Those early years were a simple in many ways, touched with a yearning for




## Students Yearn To Know God!

## Hub City The Next Move!

Floyd Beckstrand, class of '52, who is now pastor of Finley Assembly of God in Finley, North Dakota, and Silas Liechty, class of '53, who is president of Liechty Mobile Homes, Inc., in Jamestown, North Dakota, and one of Trinity's Board of Directors.

By 1960, enrollment had reached 44 students and administrators sought for a larger campus. A church in Aberdeen, South Dakota, had recently constructed a building designed for educational purposes and was looking for a tenant. This became Trinity's new home, and the college was renamed Hub City Bible Institute. (Aberdeen was known as the "Hub City" of the Dakotas. The school's slogan was, "Located in the heart of the Dakotas with a heart for the youth of the Dakotas.")

The class of 1960 had two graduates who would become well-known evangelists across the United States and on television — and eventually lead Trinity. You guessed it —





The Bible lies next to this textbook for a purpose. At Trinity the textbooks and God's Word go hand in hand for class work and personal devotions. The Bible is an important part of the curriculum at Trinity but there is also a big emphasis on making the Word a living part of students' lives.

## Wead Becomes First President

Costs looked a little better then, with one semester's tuition at \$175, board at \$160 and room at \$90.

In those days, there were no electives, and students had to take every subject offered. One afternoon each week, students had to engage in ministry work at nursing homes or jails.

A faculty member at Hub City, Doris Nixon, spoke this past year on campus and today serves as a missionary to American Indians.

The student population continued to grow at Hub City more than board directors had imagined — in fact, enough to demand the need for another new facility.

In the fall of 1967, with 197 students, Trinity relocated at the former Trinity Hospital in Jamestown, North Dakota. The school logically became named, "Trinity Bible Institute."

In 1968, the college's rapid growth called for a full-time president to take charge. From South Bend, Indiana, would come one of the most influential men in the history of





## The Million Dollar Miracle!

That summer, Wead wrote to Trinity students home on break, "These are exciting times! We are looking forward to the big day of the year, September 27, when you all will be back home with us at TBI."

Meanwhile, Wead faced what was now a typical problem for Trinity overcrowding. He began an intense hunt to find a new campus.

His visionary genius and political ties enabled him to secure the former branch campus of the University of North Dakota in Ellendale, North Dakota — Trinity's current location.


The money to purchase the campus could have come right from a pauper's pocket. In a move that would later be called a "multi-million dollar miracle," Wead bought the \$4 million, 28-acre campus, with its six major

buildings — including a 65,000 volume library — for \$1!

Yearbooks then tell about the revival "fires" that swept the campus: "The power of God struck TBI this year as lightning strikes a tree."

In 1982, Pastor Ron Hastie of Peoria, Illinois, replaced Wead. He soon resigned and in 1983, the board of directors appointed Evangelist Lowell Lundstrom as president.

President Lundstrom has met with great success from the start. At the beginning of his term, enrollment was at a serious low of 289 students. By 1986, the student population reached an all-time record high of 550 students.

Because of his influence, Trinity is more dedicated than ever to training Spirit-filled men and women for worldwide evangelism.

Saving the lost was Trinity's goal 40 years ago — and on this special birthday, this God-given commission remains just as important and critical as ever!

The only difference may be that today's students have to move faster for the night is closer than before!

Dear Trinity Students,

Charles Spurgeon was a great pastor and evangelist in London whose sermons burned and blazed with Holy Ghost power.

Thousands turned out to hear this man of God thunder against sin — pointing men and women to the Savior, Jesus Christ.

One day, he was approached by the editor of the "London Times," who asked for permission to print his sermons. (At this time, the paper was distributed worldwide, even though it was delayed in delivery.) Spurgeon turned to the editor and said, "You can print my sermons, but you can't print my fire."

It is very difficult to put into words the wonderful things God has done for us at Trinity this year. We can print the words, but we can't print the fire.

John the Baptist said of Jesus, "He shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost and fire."

The fire is what made Trinity wonderful this year —









## "For God So Loved ... Shouldn't We?"

Trinity President Lowell Lundstrom often says, "There are five billion people in the world and only two billion have heard of Jesus Christ — that means there are three billion people to reach!"

This is the reason Trinity sponsors two missions conventions a year — to make students aware of the need to spread the Gospel — and to discover if God is calling them to the mission field, at home and abroad.

The theme for the Fall Missions Convention, October 29 & 30, 1987, was, "For God So Loved . . . Shouldn't We?" The special guest speaker was G. Edward Nelson, who is Secretary of the Assemblies of God Foreign Missions Department and oversees 1,464 AG missionaries in 118 world countries.



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
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



The youth program for junior high and high school students offers plenty of opportunities for Christian growth.














# Elementary Education — Preparing Shepherds For Tomorrow's Youth










## Champions Once Again!






## Intramurals — Come As You Are!


























### Garrison — Everyone's ''Mom''

The Senior Class of 1988 remembers Kaye Garrison, a Trinity faculty member from 1968-83, who died on May 15, 1987, in Hingham, Massachusetts. She was 56.

Garrison taught Christian Ministries and her husband, Robert, taught Biblical Studies and History. Both directed the student music group "Troubadors" for 14 years.

# Wead — A Million Dollar Memory!

He took a \$1 bill and turned it into a miraculous new beginning for Trinity. But the legacy Dr. Roy Wead leaves behind today is a priceless one.

The former Trinity president, from 1968-82, died Easter Sunday morning in his hometown of Springfield, Missouri. He was 70.

He is perhaps best known for launching Trinity's multi-million dollar miracle, when he offered the state \$1 for the former branch campus of the University of North Dakota — Trinity's current home in Ellendale. The deal was signed in 1972, and by 1975, a soaring 450 students enrolled.


