






This has been a year of change for Lundstrom. Serving as Trinity's President for seven years, his new position gives him continued contact with, and influence at the school.



On January 30, during his "State of the Campus" address, President Ray Trask shared his goals, desires and projections for Trinity Bible College.


"Trinity exists for a special purpose and I desire to help that purpose come about," stated Trask. "I want to make the chapel a classroom of the Holy Spirit."






The Missions Program is designed to prepare students for missionary service at home and abroad.

"General Education is the most important component of the undergraduate curriculum," says Lavonne Larson. "Given that the average person changes vocations five times in a working career, General Education courses give them the skills to make them flexible enough to adapt to the new job opportunities as they present themselves."



people with lasting value in getting their hearts right with God."



We, the graduating class of 1991, give tribute to Brother Maddox for his administrative and spiritual leadership while at Trinity.



With 'Pierce the Darkness with the Light of Christ' as their theme, missionaries and evangelists from around the world addressed the 1991 Spring Missions Convention.



Devoted to teaching principles of obedience, faithfulness and communication with God, Pastor Jones and his dedicated staff provide examples of leadership for future ministers to follow.





Pastor Jones relaxes at home with wife, Mary, Mikey, Adam and Jennifer.



Evangelism Teams

"You must be born again," spoken to Nicodemus by Jesus (John 3:7) is the motivation that has Trinity's witnessing teams out on the streets of neighboring towns every week.

In the Fall semester, 15 two-person teams were sent out every week. They knocked on every door in Kulm, Edgely and Napoleon, North Dakota.

At the same time weekly outreaches into Jamestown, Oakes and Ashley, North Dakota and Aberdeen, South Dakota continued.

The Evangelism Ministry teams led by juniors, Andy Samms and Brian Kelly, personally contacted over 800 people, presented the Gospel to 325 and had 52 first time commitments to Christ.

The Two Question Test, taught in Personal Evangelism, simply asks, "Are you going to heaven?" and "How do you know?" Through this unique technique the door has been opened for many to come to Christ.


According to Kelly, who also teaches Personal Evangelism, the goal of the Evangelism Ministry is "to equip students and church members in effective evangelism techniques that will help the college and church fulfill the Great Commission on the streets and doorsteps of the Upper Midwest."



Next year's team looks strong as five members will be returning. There are also plans to join the Aberdeen Spring Men's Volleyball League which will result in a minimum of 15 matches.


