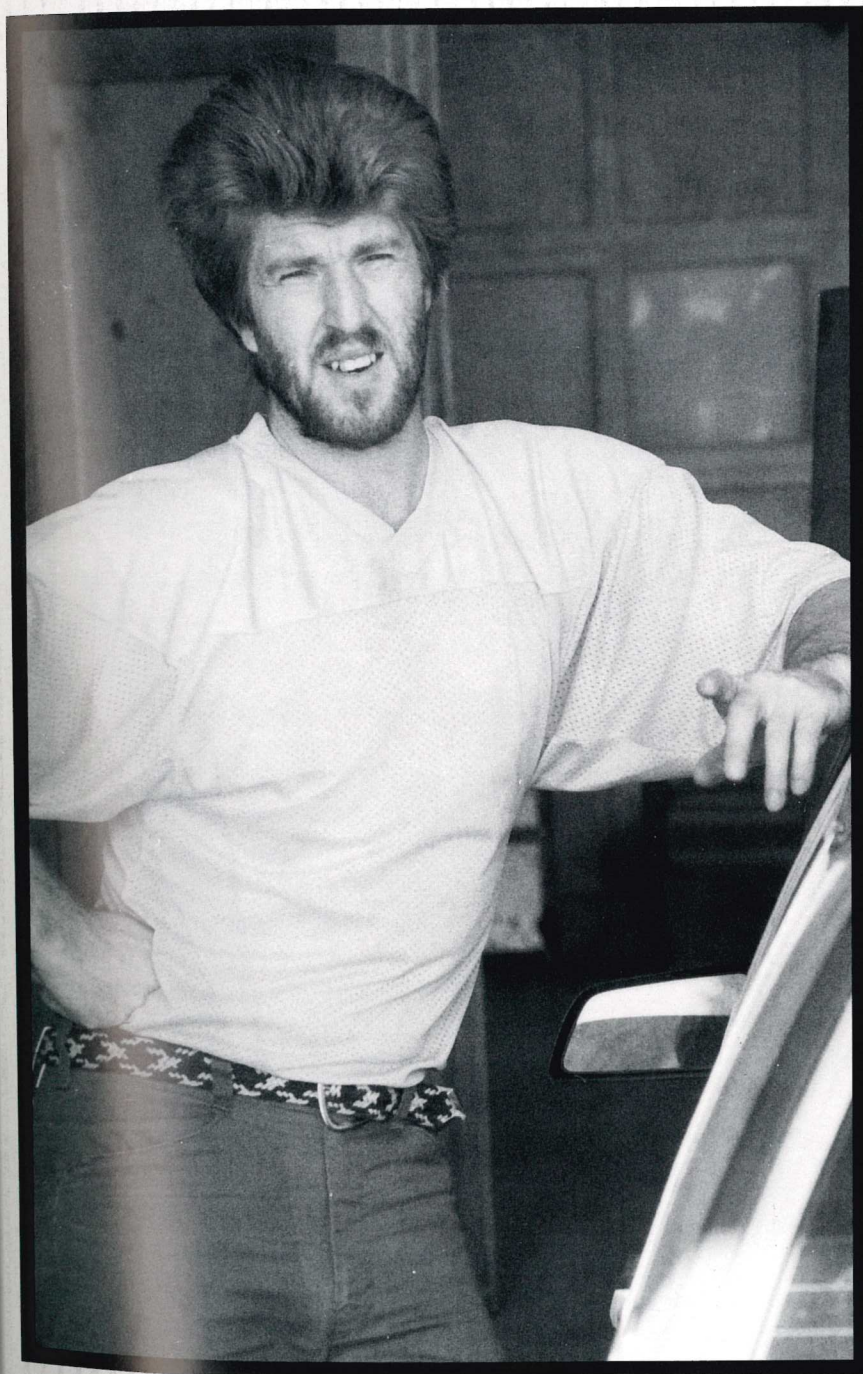
Dedication

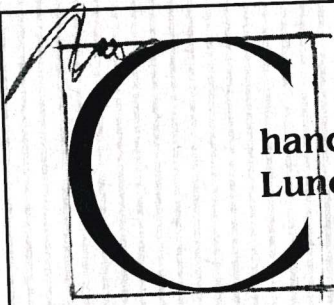


Appreciation

Not only has Lowell Lundstrom been faithful to Trinity for many years, his dynamic leadership continues to anoint the college. We, as a college community, are indebted to him.



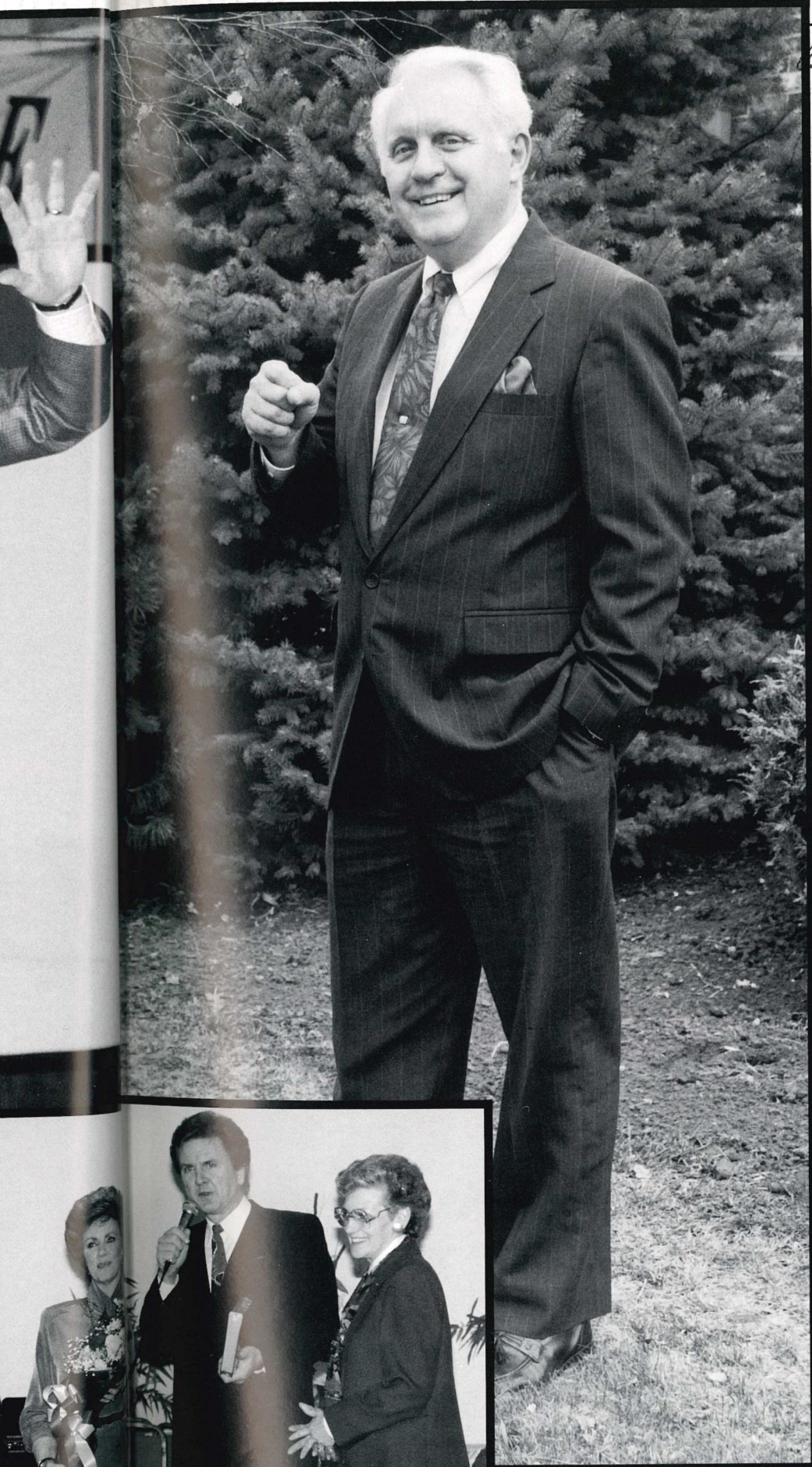

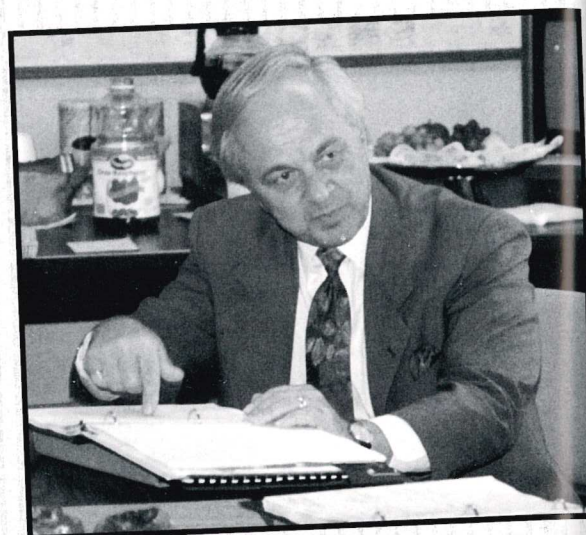

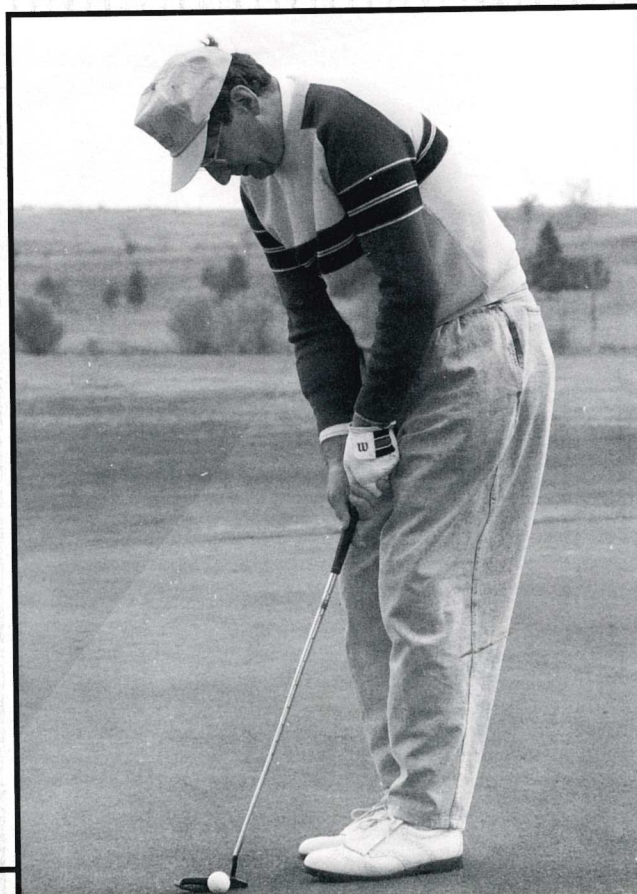
Farewell . . .

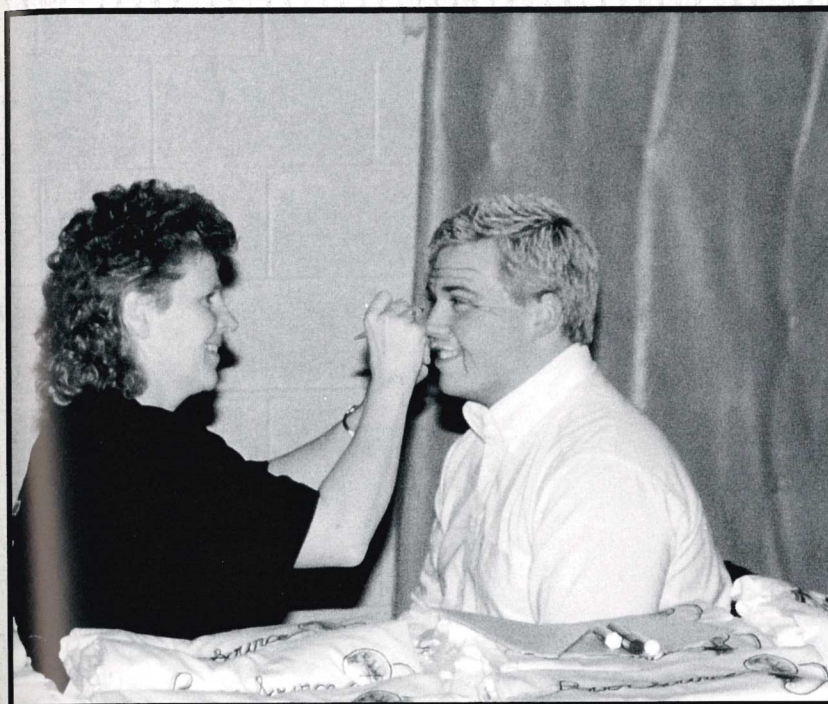
YOUTH

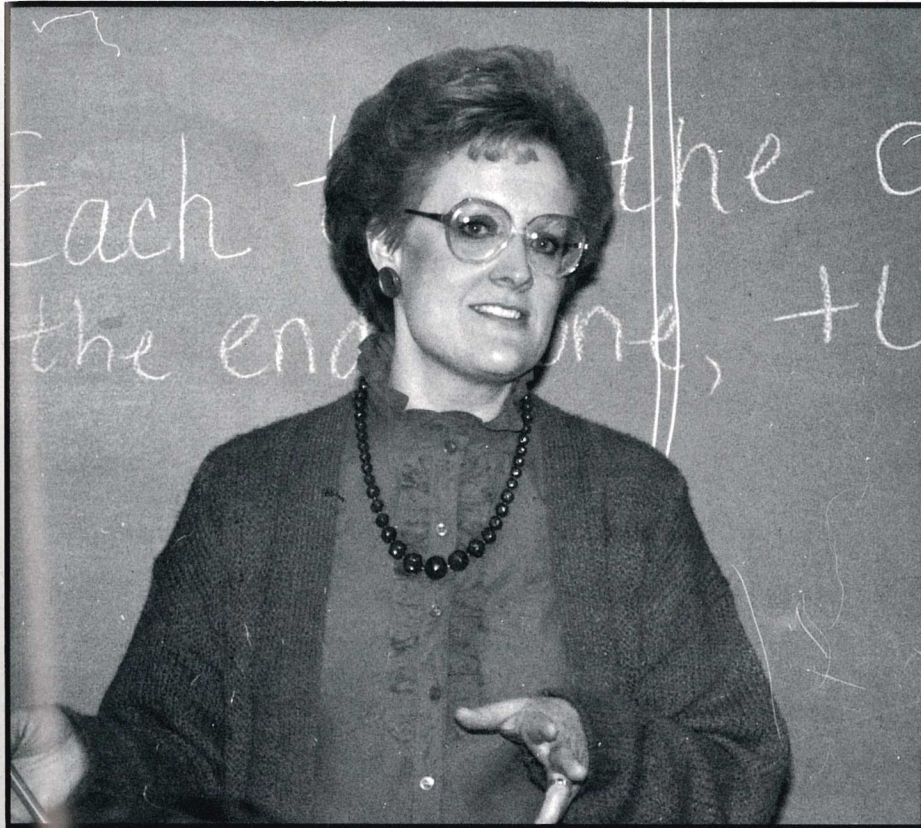
BUSINESS

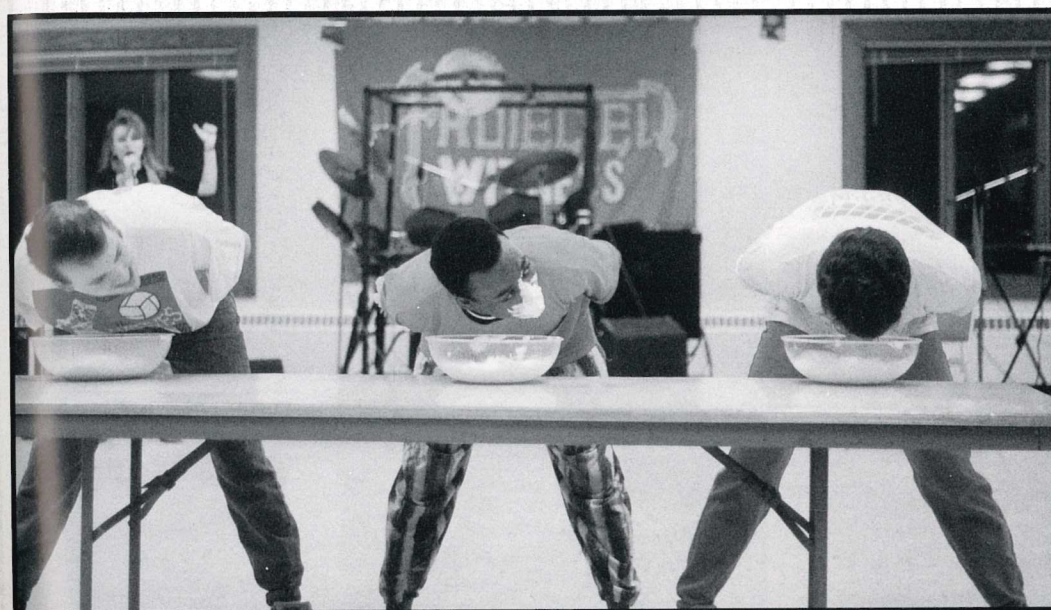
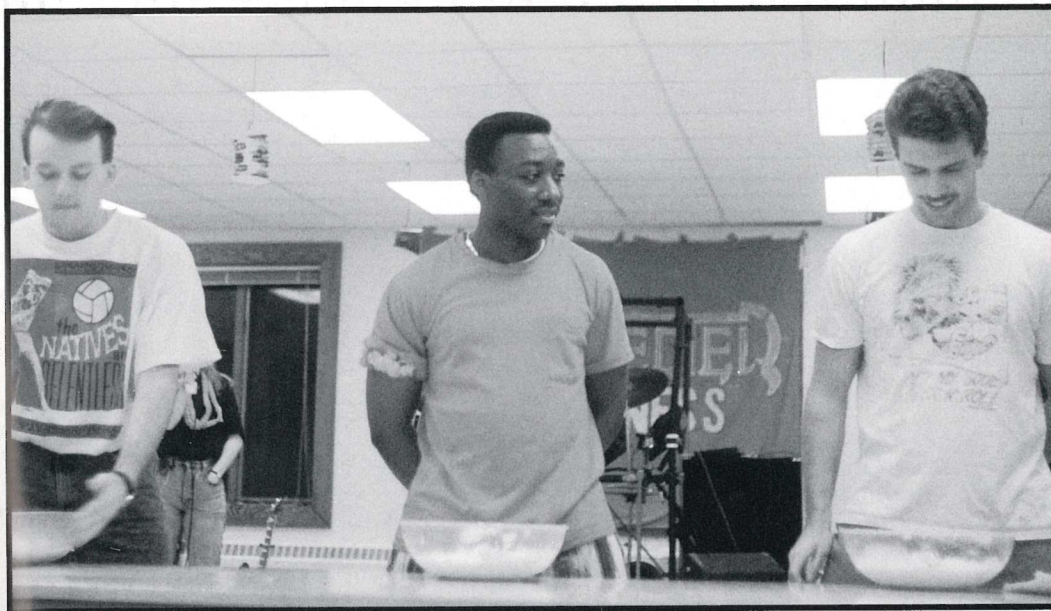
Planning for a Positive Image

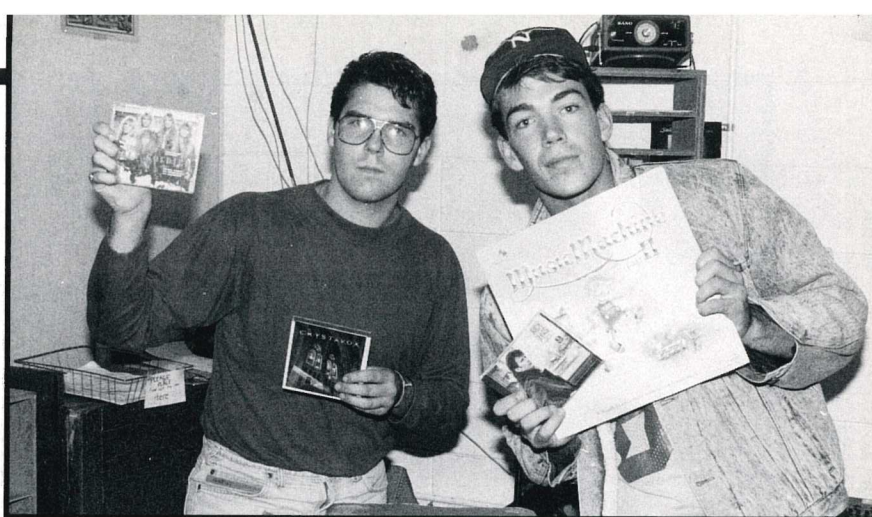
WHERE THE WORD IS IN THE MUSIC

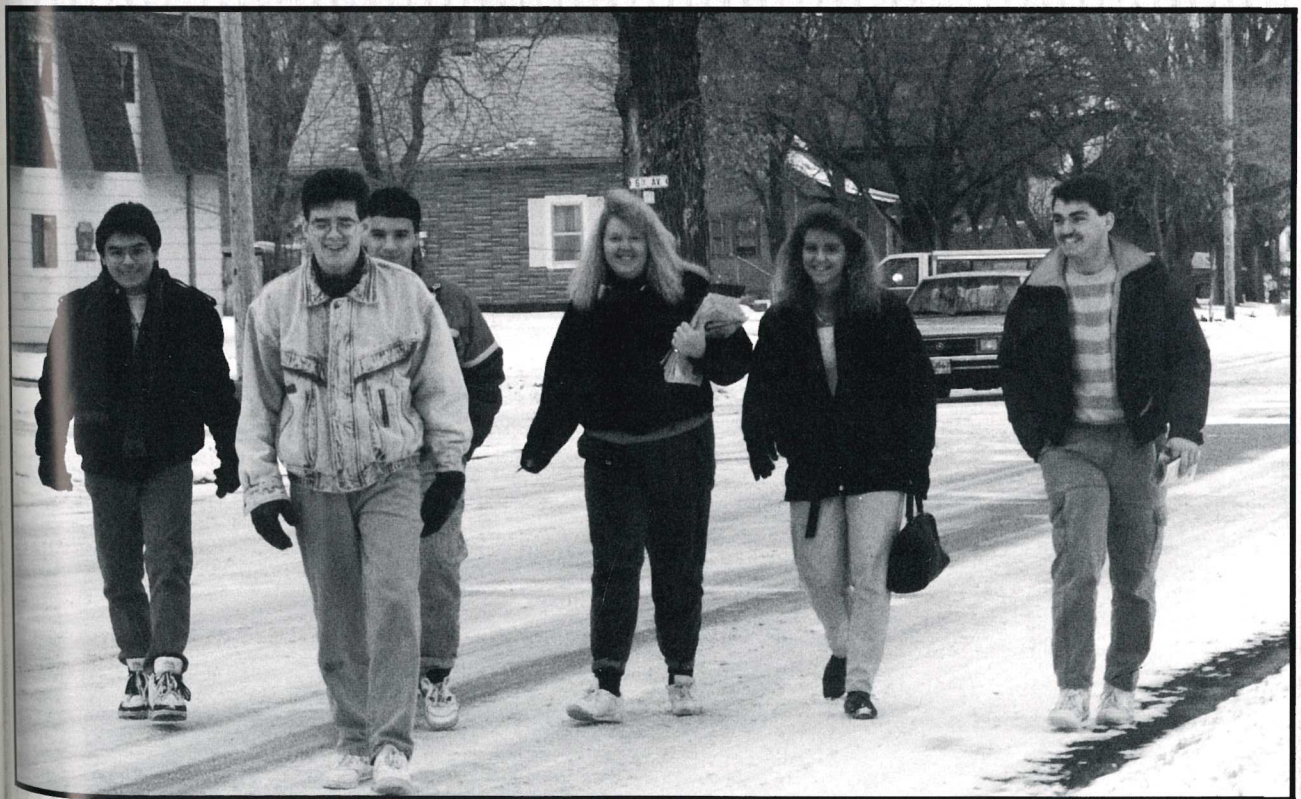

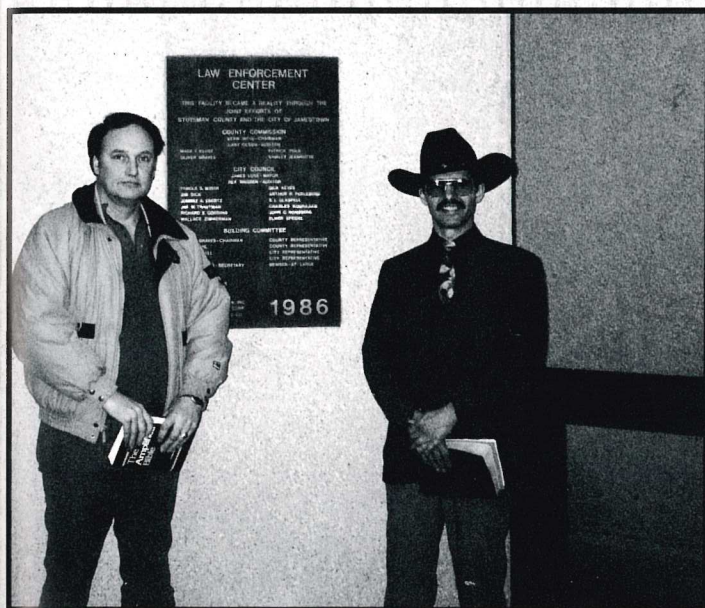


Door Always OPEN

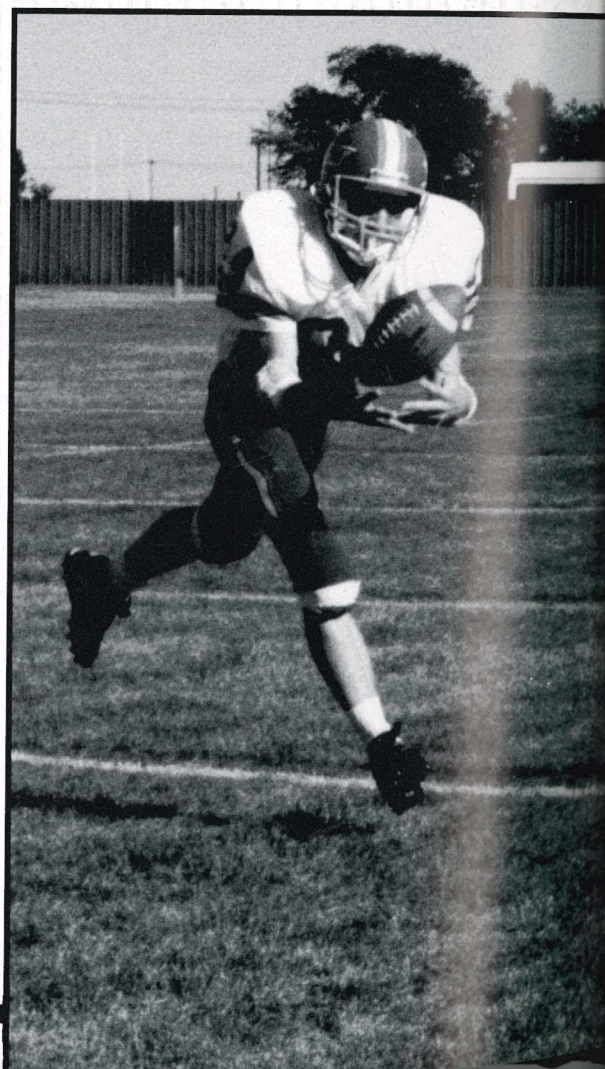

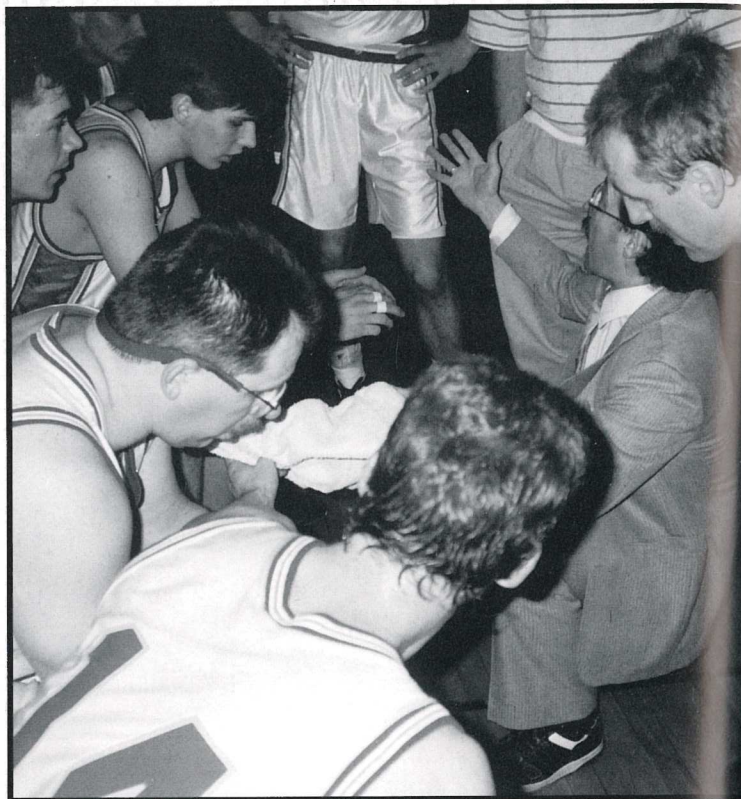


EXCITEMENT

The tradition can only continue . . .



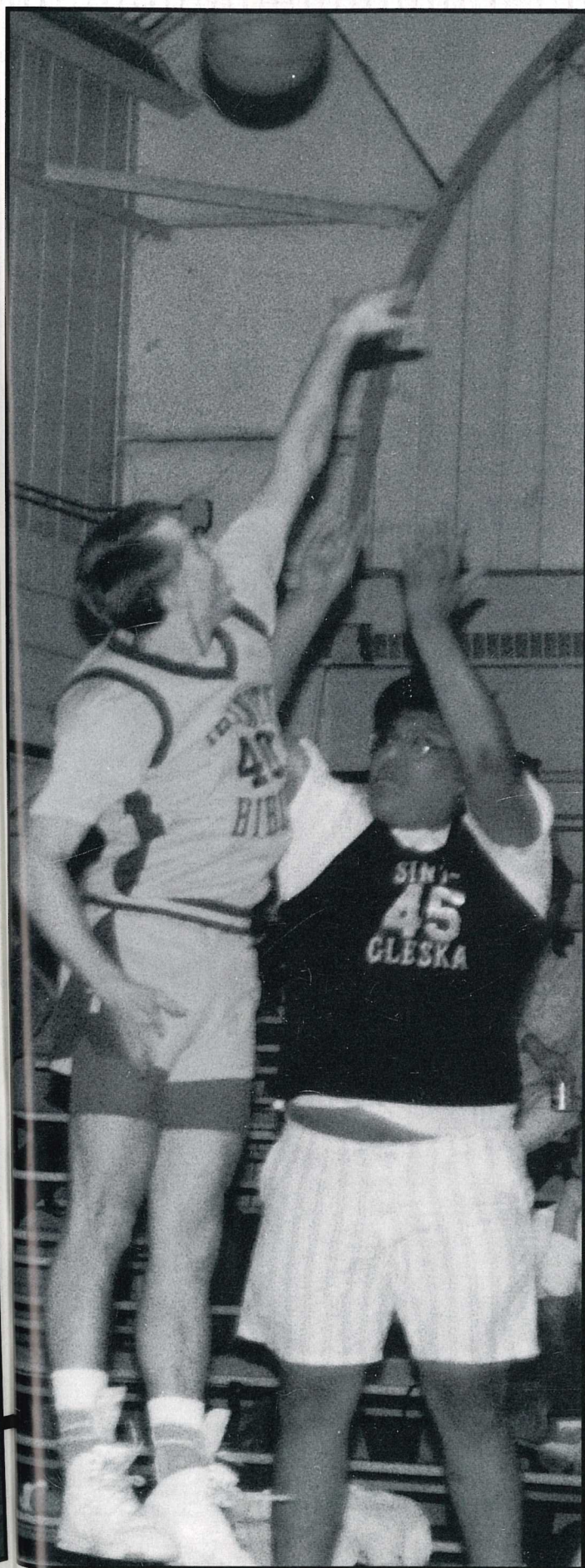

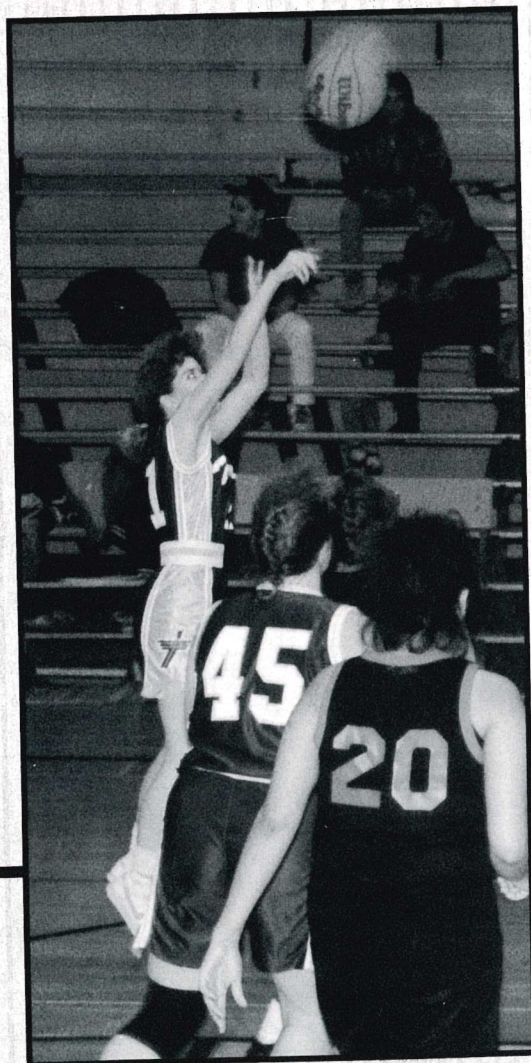
