
The Teen Challenge Training Center is America's largest and most successful drug and alcohol rehabilitation program. The Training Center began with eight men in a farmhouse on a dairy farm in Rehrersburg, Pennsylvania, thirty-five miles east of Harrisburg. From the humble beginnings in that small farm house, the Center has grown to 300 students.

The Teen Challenge Training Center works with men who have had life controlling problems with drugs, alcohol, or crime. It introduces them to a rehabilitative process wherein they are able to learn to function as productive members of society. Applying Christian principles, moral standards, and instruction in responsibility towards family and society helps to produce a good start toward legitimate vocation. The program is widely recognized as a total cure for the whole man.

Through Christ, Teen Challenge is succeeding in their goal to turn their students from their abusive cycles into useful Christians who make solid contributions to the home, the church, and our communities. Trinity Bible College was privileged to host U-Turn, a drama team representing this excellent ministry during our Fall 1993 Missions Convention. For those committed to the cause of Christ and having presented themselves as a living sacrifice, the athletic way is indeed a marvelous way to go.



Coach Godding has been a member of the TBC faculty for two years, and has also been head coach of the mens football team. We asked Coach Godding to answer questions about football as a ministry and how it builds Godly character:

Q: How do you feel football prepares for the ministry?






Alumni Days '93

Paul answered the call, will you?




became only the fifth team to repeat as Super Bowl champions with a 30-13 victory over the Buffalo Bills in Super Bowl XXVIII at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta. The loss extended the Bills' record to four straight Super Bowl losses. Emmitt Smith of the Cowboys won the MVP award.




The Toronto Blue Jays won the 1993 World Series. Joe Carter became the second player to end a World Series with a home run, hitting a three-run shot off Mitch Williams in the ninth inning of Game Six that gave the Blue Jays their second straight championship with an 8-6 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies. Toronto became the first repeat World Series champions since the 1978 New York Yankees. One of the biggest stories of the 1993-1994 basketball season occurred before the first pre-season exhibition game. Michael Jordan, the world's best basketball player and one of its most famous athletes, announced his retirement.

Jordan's retirement came after he had led the Chicago Bulls to three straight National Basketball Association championships, the most recent a victory over the Phoenix Suns in the 1993 finals.






Nancy Kerrigan, who won a bronze medal for figure skating in the 1992 Olympics, was expected to win the national figuring skating title in Detroit in early January. But before she had a chance to compete, she was bashed in the knee by an unidentified assailant. Tonya Harding, who came in fourth at the 1992 Olympics, won the title. Nearly a month later, Tonya Harding's former husband, Jeff Gilloohy, pleaded guilty in the assault case. Miss Harding has consistently denied any role in planning the attack on her competitor. Within two weeks of the attack, Miss Kerrigan was completing her most difficult jumps in practice, and she was on the Olympic team.

Yasser Arafat made history in September when he signed a peace treaty with Israel. The leader of the Palestine Liberation Organization once told a reporter: "I am a freedom fighter. I am sure this is the way that history will remember me." But Arafat is also a politician, going out of his way to kiss babies, shake hands, work the crowds; always showing that he was something more than a guerrilla fighter with a three-day beard.






The 11-member crew of the space shuttle Endeavor had one mission: repair the Hubble Space Telescope. The Hubble was launched in 1990. But defects in its reflective mirrors prevented sharp images of faint stars at the edge of the universe. The Endeavor was launched on December 2 and chased the Hubble for 820,000 miles over two days. The \$629 million repair mission was a success.

Floods hit the Midwest in late spring and early summer. Thousands of farms and homes were lost, fields were swamped and towns were submerged. The stage for disaster was set during the winter, when unusually heavy snow fell. There were no midwinter thaws, so the snow melted rapidly as spring arrived, enough to cause scattered record flooding. The states that got hit the hardest were Iowa, Illinois, and Missouri, causing billions of dollars worth of damage. President Clinton signed a \$5.7 million aid package to help the victims.










Wildfires swept through Southern California in November. The 26 major fires scorched patches from Ventura County to the Mexican border. Flames consumed a total of 200,000 acres and damaged or destroyed more than 1,000 buildings. Thousands of firefighters from around the state fought the blazes without pause for days. And unpredictable winds whipped the flames from hillside to hillside and house to house.

An Amtrak train hurtled off a bridge into an inky bayou in Saraland, Alabama, early on the morning of September 22, plunging its sleeping passengers into a nightmare of fire, water, and death.

A barge had struck and weakened the bridge shortly before the wreck, which killed 47 people. It was the deadliest wreck in Amtrak's 23-year history. But 159 people survived, and some helped other passengers who clung to wreckage from a collapsed section of the bridge in a swamp crawling with alligators and snakes.





Forty seconds that shook Los Angeles. At 4:31 on Monday morning, January 17, an earthquake registering 6.6 on the Richter Scale jolted residents of Southern California from their sleep. It was not the Big One, but it left at least 55 people dead, brought down major freeways, and destroyed or damaged thousands of homes. The quake caused an estimated \$30 billion in damage.
